Ohio Triumphs Over Illini 7-0

Gives Presidential State, Honors in Western Conference.

URBANA, Ill., Nov. 21.—Ohio State carried the 1920 football championship of the Western Conference back to the presidential state last night. In the most spectacular finish seen on Illinois field in years the Ohioans triumphed over Illini 7-0 in the deciding game of the Big Ten race yesterday, when Myers in the last ten seconds of play snatched a 37-yard forward pass from Workman and dashed across the Illinois line for the one touchdown of the game. The goal was successfully kicked by Pete Stinchcomb, the brilliant Ohio left halfback.

By winning this game Ohio remained undefeated this season, and has undisputed claim to the title. Both eleven were keyed to a fighting pitch, and were on even terms until the final few minutes of play. Illini, weakened through the loss of Captain John Depler, the all-Western center; Carney, forward pass star, and Ralph Fletcher, kicker and halfback, were stubbornly to check the attack of Ohio's superb back field. The Ohio team carried the fight into Illinois' territory during most of the game, although each eleven marched the ball to within inches of the opposing goal.

Sarnia C. I.'s Superb Passing Beats Galt

22-1 Score Rolled Up by Sarnia Puts Them in Finals With De La Salle—Spectator Saw Open Rugby Played Faultlessly by Borderers.

Sarnia C. I. rugby squad defeated Galt Collegians here in a sudden death O. R. F. U. interscholastic semi-final Saturday afternoon, and grabbed the right to meet De La Salle in the finals by a score of 22-1.

Each team brought along a good-sized crowd of supporters and an unexpectedly large number of London fans turned out in the wintry weather to watch the two school teams put up the best exhibition of rugby seen at Tecumseh Park for many near-winters. The playing field was snow-covered, while that made the going slippery and uncertain and forced both teams to get along on their own. It also gave the spectators a chance to see wide open rugby in one department of the game, and that was punting, and that counted very little, considering that they got down under even the shortest boots, and usually made gains on the exchanges. Their back division divided the kicking duties, but Raynor, Galt's star punter, took them all on and literally kept the aggressive Sarnians back at times.

All except one of Sarnia's scores came as the indirect result of their faultless handling of a wet, slippery oval in superb across-the-field passing. The Sarnians five-yard line now all afternoon, and found when they made the attempt that the Galt line held. A bucking ball was not converted, and again around the end for a chance and then passing attack, either to left or right, clean across the field, they always gained the Borderers' ground, and gave the spectators a chance to see the open brand of the game at its best.

Galt put up a game fight throughout, but were out of a team capable of making many intermediate teams do a hard afternoon's work.

The first few minutes of play decided both teams against bucking, and both opened on a kicking game. About half way through Sarnia started a pass play down the left side of the field, which landed on Galt's five-yard line and four men had figured in the play. Newton carried the ball over on a buck, but the touchdown was not converted. Sarnia made some small gains on kicking exchanges, and Galt was on the way for a big slice of ground, but a fumble on an on-side kick paid it down.

A run by Hayes opened the left end for 25 yards opened the second quarter, and Raynor, Galt's star punter, took a 15-yard dash around the right. Teskey was injured and replaced by Donahue. Galt got possession of a loose ball, but failed to make any headway on either backs or passing. They held a hard Sarnia assault, and then were wide open when Corey took a 35-yard dash through centre, but made a forward pass on Galt's five-yard line and took another 20-yard run a few moments after, and another dash from near centre gave Sarnia the lead. The forward throw again, McGibbin ran out a healthy foot of Raynor's 20 yards, and on the down Sarnia caught on on-side kick. Garvey picked the ball off a Galt man's shoulder and trekked 40 yards down the field for a touchdown. The kick was wide. Sarnia 10, Galt 0.

BIG HOCKEY LEAGUE WILL CONSIST OF FOUR MAIN TEAMS

Ottawa, Montreal, Toronto and Hamilton to Comprise Group.

Montreal, Nov. 22.—The National Hockey League will consist during the coming season of four teams—Ottawa, Montreal, Toronto, and Hamilton. This was learned following a meeting at the Windsor Hotel on Saturday of the governors of the league. The season will open about December 22, and will run until early in March, when the eastern final will go to the Pacific Coast to play the Seattle, Vancouver or Vancouver team for the Stanley cup and the championship of the world.

Two applications for the fourth franchise were made by P. J. Duggan, managing director of the Montreal Arena, and by Percy J. Thompson, manager of the New Hamilton Arena. Final decision will be given at the annual meeting at Toronto next Saturday, but the probability is towards Hamilton getting it. There will be a double schedule of games, with 12 matches at home and 12 on the road for each team.

Rumors that the St. Patrick Club of Toronto had passed in to the hands of Eddie Livingstone, and Percy J. Quinn were shown to be absolutely false.

The Ottawa and Canadiens teams were given permission to play a series of exhibition games next month in Brooklyn and Philadelphia.

Argos Have Close Margin To Meet Varsity In Finals

Toronto Had Score 6-2, But Rowers Stage Very Late Come-Back.

TORONTO, Nov. 21.—Argonauts, champions of the Intercollegiate Rugby League, qualified to play Toronto Varsity in the Dominion championships by the narrowest possible margin. They defeated Toronto O. R. F. U. by 7 to 6, and at one time the score was 6 to 2 against them. It was an anti-climax for the rowers after their success in the "Big run." Their supporters contend that the Toronto had all the "breaks," and that when Argos came to their own in the last quarter they played rings around the O. R. F. U. team.

Some supporters, on the other hand, consider their predictions that they would defeat Argonauts or give them the closest possible run for the money, was borne out by the results. The prophets now predict that Argonauts will be the mark for Varsity, and as regards the outcome of next Saturday's game there will not be any too much confidence in the rowers' camp.

ST. CLAIR WINS THE GALT REPORTER 5-MILE ROAD RACE

Revived Event Witnessed by Thousands Under Bad Weather Conditions.

GALT, Nov. 21.—That the good old sport of road racing has lost none of its attractiveness in these parts was evidenced here Saturday afternoon, when the Reporter road race was revived under the auspices of the Galt Club. While conditions under foot were sloppy and it was raining, thousands lined the street to watch the runners and a crowd of 42 entries, 35 faced the starter, and 25 completed the course within the time limit of 35 minutes, which, considering the conditions, was a remarkable showing of above course of about 14 miles, was confined to the city and the route was only open to residents of South Waterloo, the object being to encourage the sport in these parts. Aroli St. Clair, a local runner, was the winner of the Reporter Cup and a gold medal also won by Galt's Heick Limited, finishing about 300 yards ahead of G. Bradford of Preston. His time was 28 1/2 minutes, which was exceptional considering the condition of the roads. He displayed experience in his running and won special prizes for being first to pass two points, and at no time was he in danger.

The interval between the race can best be told by the fact that the starters varied in age from 13 to 60 years, and the boys made a good showing throughout. George Watson, the youngest runner, received a small silver cup, and J. M. Rathbone, the oldest, a pipe. Following the race, the presentation of prizes took place at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. Mercer officiating. All told there were 25 prizes, six for the first six to finish and 19 for the others in special. The race will be an annual event.

80,000 See Field Goals Beat Old Eli's Blue Guard

Reputed repeatedly in their attacks on the Yale line yesterday, Harvard reported to a kicking offensive, and with three goals defeated Yale by a score of 9 to 0 in the annual football combat in the Yale bowl.

The contest, witnessed by close to 80,000 spectators, said to be the largest crowd that ever attended an athletic event in the United States, was the 29th meeting between the universities since 1875, and was a remarkable exposition of the modern open and aerial game, and while loosely played at times fairly bristled with thrilling forward passes and sweeping runs.

The defeat of Yale, while not unexpected, took a most unusual turn due to the ragged, but the savage defense of the Elis, who, facing a far more finished football machine, refused to be awed by the Harvard juggernaut. Although the fierce charges of the Crimson several times drove the Elis back to the shadow of their goal post, the Blue team fought so doggedly that a touchdown was a physical impossibility for their opponents.

In this crisis Harvard fell back upon the kick for field goal, and three times out of five tries booted the ball between the uprights. Yale, defeated, but not disgraced, left the field with the satisfaction of having partially checked its greatest rival, when the odds were 2 to 1 against them.

Nearly Four Millions Bet At Windsor Jockey Club Meets

Is Best Report Received From Five Clubs L. Government.

TORONTO, Nov. 20.—The report furnished the authorities at Parliament Buildings today as to the receipts and disbursements connected with the first meeting of the Windsor Jockey Club shows a profit of over \$30,000. The receipts total \$573,732, these including pari-mutual commission of \$385,495 and \$137,155 at the gate. The expenditures amounted to \$267,020.

The total amount wagered was \$3,843,955, and the percentage taken by the club was 10 per cent. This is the most flourishing of the reports received from five clubs so far.

Walsh of Simcoe Cleans Up \$11,610 On Small Tracks

SIMCOE, Nov. 20.—George Walsh has returned to Simcoe, and is setting up his winter quarters.

Mr. Walsh went out last spring with a string of six locally produced horses and put up a big season's work, often driving three races in a single afternoon.
