In the most spectacular finish seen on Illinois Field in years the Ohioans triumphed over Illinois, 7 to 0, in the deciding game of the Big Ten race yesterday, when Myers in the last ten seconds of play snatched a 37-yard forward pass from Workman and dashed across the Illinois line for the one touchdown of the game. 
