The portrait of the late archbishop, hanging in the south alsle, was draped in purple also.

At 10.30 the great concourse of mourners began to file thru the cathedral, passing the purple draped copper casket in the middle aisle near the chancel steps.

The pepping sentences of the burial service were read by the Rt. Rev. Dr. DuMoulin, Bishop of Niagara. Next was chanted Psalm xc. in the prayer-book version, to the chant, Felton in C. minor:
