Ottawa, Ont., June 19 .- The scope of the agreement nerthed by the Canada West Indies conference is fidicated in an official statement issued this afternoon. The text of the agreement, as indicated in an

the agreement, as indicated in an earlier despatch will not be made public till August 4th, but in general says the statement, "it may be stated that the agreement:

"(1) Carries the assent of all the delegates present at the conference.

"(2) Is framed upon an increase of the mutual preference now granted and an extension of the list of products upon which preference has hitherto been given.

"(3) Includes in the mutual preference all the British Colonies in the twest indies.

(West Indies,

"(4) Contemplates mutual co-operation of the signatories towards the provision and maintenance of improved steamship transport and includes a memorandum urgently pressing for improved cable communica-West Indies.

All Represented. The statement proceeds:
"The labors of the Canada-West Indies conference have been brought to an end after a session of days. All an end after a session of days. All the colonial governments have been represented, which marks a notable advance over the conference of 1912, when some of the most important administrations were not included.

"The terms of the agreement will not be made current until Aug. 4, to give time for the delegates to report to their various governments before publicity is given.
