Owing to the increased export munition traffic at the port of Saint John, the Canadian Pacific Railway Company has found it necessary to extend its round house at Bay Shore, in the Parish of Lancaster, to provide additional accommodation for locomotives. To make the extension to the round house it is essential to occupy about twenty feet in width of the road connecting Bay Shore and Sea street. There will be ample accommodation on the remaining portion for the public.

A bill has been introduced in the legislature authorizing the use of a portion of this road by the company for this purpose and the municipalities committee of the legislature has appointed on June 10th, 1917, instant, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon at the House of Assembly, Fredericton, as the time and place when parties interested in this bill can be heard and consideration given to any objection to the bill. The road is one in name only, it is actually unimproved, and about 40 feet in width will be left available at this place for all traffic, which should be ample for all future requirements.

A motor in which they were driving was struck at a level crossing by a train. At the time they were on their way to Pottstown, Pa., to join their show.

Mr. Lukens was the proprietor of the animal show. His wife was one of the performers in an animal act. While in Fredericton and Chatham Mr. and Mrs. Lukens were accompanied by their two little sons.

PRESIDENT TENER SUSPENDS MCGRAW

New York, June 9.—President John K. Tener of the National League announced on Saturday that he had suspended John J. McGraw, manager of the New York Nationals, for an indefinite period as a result of an attack upon Umpire Byron in Cincinnati on Friday.

McGraw admitted hitting Byron, but said he had provoked the umpire and the manager became engaged in an argument when they met under the grandstand after McGraw had been ordered from the contest as a result of disputing a decision by Byron.

"I met Byron near the umpire's dressing room after the game," says McGraw. "I had been ordered from the field during the game. Byron said to me: 'McGraw, you were run out of Baltimore.' I answered: 'Do you say that I was run out of Baltimore?'"

"He answered: 'That's what they say about me.' I answered: 'Well, don't you say that about me.'"

"Then I hit him. I maintain that I was given reason."

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TO BEGIN WORK AT CLARENDON ST. SOON

(Continued from page 1.) When the motion was put Commissioner McLellan arose, saying: "I won't vote on the matter and I won't sit at any more meetings until the council shows that it knows its own mind in the matter. I have had enough of this." He then retired from the committee room. The motion was put and passed.

Other Retaining Walls

A resolution relating to retaining walls was presented as a matter of motion by Commissioner Fisher, as follows: "That the following retaining walls be rebuilt with cement concrete by the public works department and that payment for same be made by a bond issue or that the amounts be added to some other issue of bonds for retaining walls: Broad street, corner Pitt, estimated cost, \$374; Simonds street, corner Camden, estimated cost, \$483."

He also submitted another resolution, as notice of motion to be made on Tuesday, as follows: "That specifications be prepared and tenders invited for the rebuilding of the following retaining walls with cement concrete and that payment for same be made by one or several bond issues: Brussels street, opposite vacant lots, estimated cost, \$2,000; St. James street, St. John West, from Ludlow to Watson streets, \$2,500; Main street, from Murray to Sheriff street, \$10,000."

In reply to the mayor, the commissioner said the total for all job mentioned would be \$15,500.

Commissioner Wigmore protested against undertaking the Main street work without further examination to ascertain definitely if reconstruction is needed for the entire length suggested.

Commissioner Fisher asked the road engineer if it would be possible to repair the walls opposite Mrs. Lawson's property.

Mr. Hatfield said he believed that he could patch up the place where the wall had broken out but that any attempt at rebuilding would be impossible. He believed that even sinking test holes might precipitate the collapse of the wall.

Commissioner Wigmore said that if that occurred there would then be no doubt of the need of the work.

Commissioner Fisher said the wall had been reported in a dangerous condition and he thought it should be attended to.

It was agreed that test pits should be sunk and an action deferred until a report is received.

Commissioner Wigmore was given authority to purchase 450 feet of eight inch cast iron pipe and 738 feet of six inch pipe at \$55 per ton, and a quantity of special castings at six cents per pound, from Yroom and Arnold, who have them on hand. The prices being considerably below market levels.

On motion of Commissioner Fisher the committee recommended that Foster be permitted to construct a vault under the sidewalk in front of their premises in Dock street. The committee adjourned.

TORONTO LIBERALS FAVOR CONSCRIPTION

Toronto, June 10.—A mass meeting held in Massey Hall last night on the call of prominent Liberals of the city in the interests of the principle of conscription by selective draft was attended by thousands, the building being filled to its utmost capacity.

The principal speakers were Dr. Michael Clark, M. P., of Red Deer, and N. W. Rowell, leader of the Ontario opposition, both of whom came out flat-footed with the view that the urgent needs of the country must outweigh all party exigencies, and that Canada's honor was involved in replenishing the depleted ranks at the front in the only way in which it could be done effectively.

Other Earthquake Shocks

Washington, June 10.—Observers at Georgetown University reported today that their seismograph had recorded an earthquake approximately 3,500 miles from here, and therefore not connected with the Salvadoran quake. Signs of the disturbance were first noted at 11:45 p. m. Saturday. They lasted until nearly 1 o'clock this morning.
