## Budget Effect On Income Tax Here

It was up to the taxpayers to take the onus of making a decision as to whether they would make their income returns under the old or new law, it was said today by Norman P. MacLeod, federal inspector of taxation here. The office had received no official advice as to change in the law, but it was fair to assume the proposed changes would pass Parliament. If a taxpayer put in his report and paid his tax under the old rates, he would receive a rebate when the changes were adopted by Parliament. If he were to go by the proposed changes and put in a report under the new rates, he would have to pay the difference if the proposed changes did not go through. He also would have to pay interest on any unpaid balance from April 30.
