Upper Tier Unreserved
(New York Times)
New York, Sept. 26.—In the event that the Giants and Yankees clash in the coming world's series, the upper tier of the grand stand at the Polo Grounds will not be reserved, according to a joint announcement made by the management of the two New York major league clubs yesterday.

The same prices and reservations as last year will prevail this year. These are as follows: All box seats, \$6.00; reserved seats (lower grand stand only), \$5.50; upper grand stand (unreserved), \$3.00; bleachers (unreserved), \$1.10.

Applications for tickets for reserved seats must be accompanied by a check or money order and these tickets will be sold in series of three seats only. Due to the extended demand for tickets no applications will be accepted for more than four seats.

Tickets for the upper tier of the grand stand and for the bleachers will be sold only at the Polo Grounds, and the purchasers will be required to enter the grounds immediately. The gates will be opened every day at 10 o'clock a.m. There will be 10,000 upper grand stand seats and 12,000 bleacher seats on sale for each contest.

Scientists Look Up Siki Antecedents; Bid Dempsey Beware

Hit Him on a Head With Maul, So Much the Worse for Maul—Senegalese Wants Big Money for U. S. Bout—Still in Controversy Over Recent Battle.

Toronto, Sept. 26.—A Chicago special to the Globe says: Scientists and anthropologists at Field Museum and the University of Chicago took out their charts and reference books and looked over an assorted lot of negroid skulls today, after they had read of the Siki-Carpenter affair in Paris. The consensus was that if and when the Siki person meets up with Jack Dempsey, the aforesaid Dempsey stands an excellent chance of being clouted for a row of dog houses. The lofty braided and bearded scientist did not put in just these words, but that is what they meant.

Battling Siki, it appears from records, "come of a hard-boiled tribe. The anthropologists point out that Senegal produces a minimum of civilization and a maximum of hardship. One does not survive there without having to overcome a lot of things, that would put a white man out in the first round."

Battling Siki, they said, looks like the fittest of survivors. He has great arms and shoulders and chest. Above the shoulders, they admit, he has not much except a parking place for his hat, but what brain he possesses functions amazingly on what to do in a rumble. 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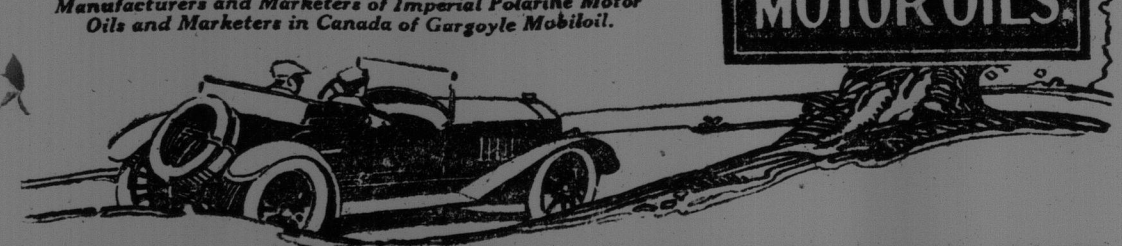
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
