Shelby, Mont., June 22—A study of the measurement of Dempsey and Gibbons shows that they will be the most evenly matched heavyweights who ever fought for the title. Corbett was twenty-three pounds lighter than Sullivan when he wrestled the crown from the old master. Fitzsimmons, in turn, was twenty-two pounds lighter than Corbett. Fitzsimmons had to give Jim Jeffries fifty-five pounds when he lost the title, and Jeffries had a decided edge in both height and weight when he lost the title to Jack Johnson. The big black man looked like a boy beside the hulking Willard at Havana, and Dempsey gave away everything but the victory when he faced the Potawatomi giant at Toledo. There will be no such discrepancies when Dempsey and Gibbons answer the gong at Shelby.

Dempsey will be a quarter of an inch taller and possibly eight pounds heavier. In all other respects the champion and challenger will be so evenly matched that further comparison is not worth while. Even in age there is only one year's difference between the two. Gibbons has been reported as thirty-four years old, but he denied it vigorously. Tommy says his brother Mike is thirty-four, but they are not twins, and that he is only twenty-nine. He adds that the record-books always have had his age wrong, but that he has never thought of it until now. As he is to battle for the championship, however, he wants his friends to know that he is not an old man meeting a youngster; that the contest will not be another of those struggles between age and youth. LION CUB BITES MOVIE ATTRACTION IN AUTOMOBILE
Peggy Davis, motion picture actress, while assisting Park Commissioner Stafford, D. Gallatin in taking two lion cubs from the Central Park Zoo to the Jubilee Exposition at Grand Central Palace, New York, was bitten by one of the cubs when they started to fight in the sedan in which they were riding.

Miss Davis had one of the cubs in her lap and the other between her and Commissioner Gallatin on the seat. When the cub began fighting the bit Riley, cf. ... 4 0 1 1 0 0 Miss Davis in the nose and scratched her hand. The other jumped on the back of the chauffeur and clawed him about the neck. Frightened by the sudden attack, the chauffeur lost control of the automobile, which collided with another car.

The sedan went to the rescue and took the Commissioner, Miss Davis, the chauffeur and the cubs to the Central Park Arsenal, where first aid was administered by Captain Brown and Lieutenant Howard.

HEAT CAUSES TRAIN WRECK
Engineer Killed When Spreading Rails Throw Locomotive Off Track.
Philadelphia, June 22—Spreading rails, due to heat, are believed to have caused the wrecking of a local passenger train on the Honesdale branch of the Delaware and Hudson Railroad at Prompton, three miles west of here, in which an engineer was killed and a fireman seriously injured.

The dead man was J. Arnold of Honesdale. The fireman, who lies in a hospital here, badly scalded, is James McDonald of Carbondale. He was making his first trip in place of the regular fireman.

The train was derailed in a deep rock cut, and the engineer was caught between the locomotive and the jagged rocks. The baggage car was derailed, but the rest of the train did not leave the tracks. No passenger was injured.

NEW GRAND MASTER.
Manchester Unity of Oddfellows Elects Officers.
London, May 24—(By Mail)—At the conference of the Manchester Unity of Oddfellows at Scarborough yesterday, Bro. George Wilkins was elected Grand Master and Bro. H. H. Brimblecombe Deputy Grand Master.

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ST. JOHN'S TURN FOR ROWING CHAMPS
What Halifax May Do in Amateur Boat Racing—The Pictou Events.
(Halifax Chronicle.)
The amateur boat racing for the season is rather unsettled yet, so far as Halifax is concerned. The weather up to the present has not been any too good for training, but the singles and four-oared shells have been manned and in the water numbers of times. The local clubs have been invited to go to Pictou for the Hector celebration regatta, but to date the information as to the programme is limited. The shell racing is scheduled to take place at Pictou July 18 and 19, and beside racing for shells there is to be racing in other classes of boats and a navy regatta. It is thought possible St. John may be represented in the shell racing and most, if not all, of the Halifax clubs would wish to be represented if satisfactory arrangements as to a proper car for carrying the shells to and fro could be assured. It is expected, however, full information regarding the Pictou meet will be received here today or tomorrow. St. Mary's Club had in mind the running of an excursion from Halifax to Pictou for the regatta there, but as excursion rates are being given

all over the Dominion for the Pictou Hector celebration these rates could hardly be beaten by a local excursion operated for the purpose of aiding in the expense of sending a representation to the regatta. It has been suggested that Halifax might be represented by a four at the Canadian Henley at St. Catharines, Ont., July 27 and 28, or the National, at Philadelphia a week later, or both, but the proposal has not been generally taken up just yet. As to four, it is understood St. Mary's Club will have as their senior quartette the four who manned the boat last season. The North West Arm Club senior four may have a change in personnel and likewise the Jubilee crews may show some changes. The Lorne Club has a crew out, with Callahan of last year's Arm crew in the bow, while Dartmouth is expected to send out a strong four, which will

include the Curren brothers, so well known in shell racing in the past. As to single scullers, there are more of them, including young new blood, ever before, and at times they seem to move in flocks as it were. Pending determination as to representation at Pictou the local club regatta dates are not announced. It is St. John's turn for the Maritime championship regatta this season and might be well if the Maritime date was announced so that the clubs could govern themselves accordingly. In the meantime things are growing active in boating and interest is working up for the season.
