London, Dec. 14. — (Canadian Press Cable).—The ruling of the Football Association that football was unsuitable for women and that in future clubs belonging to the national association should not lend the use of their grounds for women's matches will not be accepted as final by the women's clubs, who do not intend to go out of existence at the behest of the Football Association. William Henley, acting secretary of a group of women's clubs, announces that a conference will be held at Liverpool this week with the object of completing machinery for a women's football association comprising sixty clubs.

## Leonard and Tendler.

New York, Dec. 14.—Tex Rickard last night offered Benny Leonard 50 per cent of the receipts of a bout between the champion and either Lew Tendler of Philadelphia, or Sailor Friedman of Chicago. The only condition stipulated was that Leonard should weigh 135 pounds at two o'clock on the day of the bout. Rickard handed middleweight champion Johnny Wilson a check for \$35,000 yesterday, to cover his end of the bout with Bryan Downey of Cleveland, in Jersey City, last September. The money had been withheld by Rickard at the request of the New Jersey state boxing commission.


