GOOD PLANS FOR THE CADET CAMP

Here's What Has Been Arranged for Next Week — Two Chaplains.

Much interest is being taken in the cadet camp which is to be held in Sussex beginning on next Monday and ending on July 24 and this week of training and sports is being looked forward to with pleasure by many cadets in the province. Camp Commandant Lieut. Colonel A. H. H. Powell, and Lieut. Colonel A. B. Snow, who is in charge of training and the welfare of the boys, have been at Sussex and are making all arrangements possible. For the information of parents and guardians of children attending camp it might be said that a Protestant and Catholic chaplain will be present to look after the spiritual welfare of cadets and morning and evening prayers will be said. No smoking, swearing or bad language will be allowed and regular hours will be maintained and no one will be allowed out after dark. Cadet instructors will accompany the cadets to look after each lad. There will be a regularly installed field hospital on the camp grounds in case of any sickness and a doctor with a day and night nurse will be present throughout the whole camp.

Sports will be held for the amusement of all concerned. A bathing parade for those who wish to bathe in the shallow stream which runs through the grounds will be held daily from 4 to 5 o'clock p.m. under the supervision of instructors, who will be present. Shower baths and wash tables are also installed in the camp lines for the use of everybody. The camp will be lighted with electricity. Eight boys will be in each hall and ample blankets and ground sheets will be issued. A senior boy is to be placed in charge of each tent. Large marquees with benches and tables are being provided for the boys to have meals in and three meals and a supper before going to bed will be served. The drill hours will be from 9 o'clock to 12 o'clock with several resting periods and from 8 o'clock to 4 o'clock in the afternoon with several rests so that the lads will not be tired.

All parents of children are cordially invited to visit the camp at all times in order that they may see for themselves how the boys are being cared for. Physical training is being requested in the schedule of training so that any physical defects may be detected and rectified. The fourth afternoon will be given up entirely to sports and on the fifth afternoon drill competitions will be held for cups presented by Brigadier General A. H. Macdonnell, C.M.G., D.S.O., and ex-Mayor R. T. Hayes. The T.M.C.A. and Y.M.C.A. have been requested to have representatives at the camp and to install equipment for the amusement and welfare of the lads and the Y.M.C.A. have announced that there will be two men present and possibly motion pictures will be shown and concerts will be given each evening for the entertainment of all. The medical officer, Major G. C. Lawson, senior medical officer, was at Sussex yesterday looking after the medical arrangements needed and Major A. G. Lawson, senior engineer officer, was also at the camp grounds making the necessary arrangements for pitching tents and other details. Lieut. W. R. Winter was there looking after the transportation and feeding of the lads. The contract for transportation was awarded to the Evansville Hotel and contract for truckage and transport to W. J. McLaughlin, all of Sussex.

Methods which have been followed this year and last have proved so expensive that the city is made if adequate showing is to be made for the expenditure. If the present rate of expense is maintained the road lane will be exhausted without the intended work being completed.

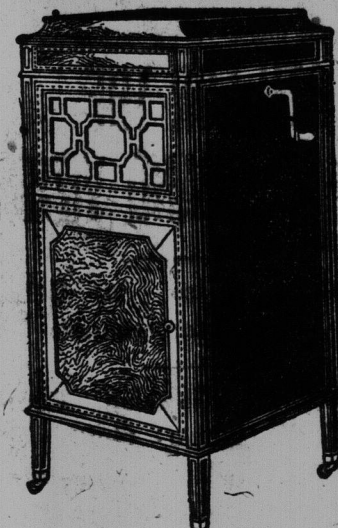
The Sinn Fein Courts
