


Still Unsettled.

THE CANADIAN MAILS

Ottawa, Nov. 7—Because of the action of the British Admiralty in taking over a great many vessels of the Canada merchant marine as military transports, the government figures out a considerable saving of money in subsidies this year. Many mail steamers being paid on a trip basis, part of the total amount appropriated will thus be forfeited. Christmas seals in aid of charitable institutions are authorized on letters again this year, but they must not resemble stamps and must be fixed to the back of the letters.
