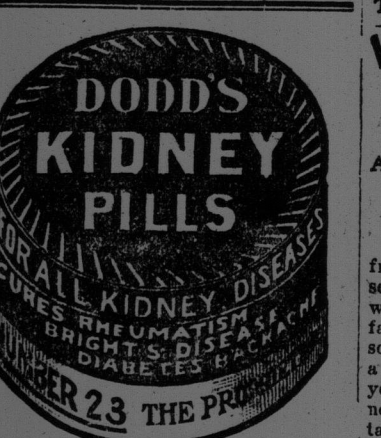

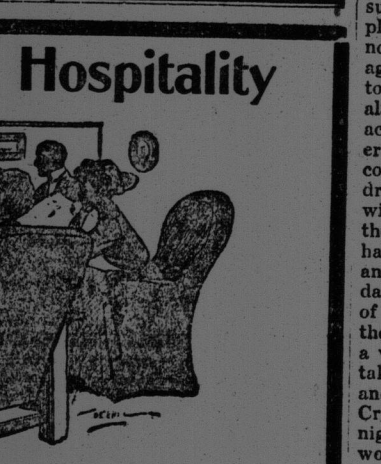

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—Because of the action of the British Admiralty in taking over a great many vessels of the Canada merchant marine as military transports, the government figures out a considerable saving of money in subsidies this year. Many mail steamers being paid on a trip basis, part of the total amount appropriated will thus be forfeited.
