POSTPONE SALE OF THE GIBSON PROPERTY
Tariff Negotiations Figure in Argument of Counsel—Sale Deferred Until April 22

In the matter of the Canadian Colored Cotton Company to postpone the sale of the Gibson Company's property for four months, the summons was returnable to-day before Chief Justice Baker. J. Roy Campbell appeared for the Canadian Colored Cotton Company and argued that on account of the possibility of reciprocity with the United States, being arrived at, large American concerns, come in and compete with the local bidders and the property might bring enough to satisfy the claim of the Canadian Colored Cotton Company.

M. G. Zuel, K. C., on behalf of David Jardine, of London, Eng., opposed the application contending that, on account of the large interest involved and the bidders having arranged to be there on the date loved, His Honor gave judgment postponing the sale until April 22. The Colored Cotton Company to pay into court \$400 to pay the expense of postponement. F. R. Taylor appeared on behalf of the Royal Trust Company and Cyrus Inches on behalf of the Bank of Montreal.

EMPRESS WILL HAVE NEARLY 500 PASSENGERS
C. P. R. Liner to Sail This Evening—The Sardinian Away—Lakonia in Port

The C. P. R. liner Empress of Ireland, Captain J. V. Forster, will sail for Liverpool via Halifax at 7 o'clock this evening with approximately eighty saloon, 190 second class, and 290 third class passengers. The P. R. train today carries in three sections with passengers for the steamer. The second section brought 182 and the third, 109, the first or regular bringing besides her regular passengers, a good number also.

Among those going across on the steamer, are—Mr. and Mrs. John McEvity, of this city, and Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Snowball, of Chatham.

Donaldson liner Cassandra, Captain John Mitchell, is due here on Monday from Glasgow with 120 passengers. The steamer was 200 miles east of Cape Race at 9 o'clock last night.

Donaldson liner Lakonia, which arrived from Glasgow last night, reports that, with the exception of one day, she had a fair run. On the day referred to, the steamer had to lay to while off the Banks on account of the heavy sea. She brought twenty-one Canadian young for Baltimore. She will sail for the latter port on the first of the week.

SENT UP FOR TRIAL
Trio to Higher Court in Connection With O'Neil Store Break

The case against Robert Elliott, Frank Sprague and John McElion, charged with breaking and entering the wholesale liquor store of P. J. O'NEIL, North wharf, was resumed this morning in the police court, and after Judge Ritchie had reviewed the evidence he committed them for trial. K. J. MacRae appeared for Elliott.

Policeman Whitten was recalled and gave evidence of the arrest. It had to do with the finding of the three men in the store on Saturday night last.

Policeman Gardner told of having been on his rounds on that night and said that while examining docks in North wharf he found that O'Neil's store open. Flashing his light, he saw the trio of prisoners inside. Going in, he asked McElion what he was doing there and was told "Nothing." Elliott gave the same reply, while Sprague said he had been with the other two." Sprague was well under the influence of liquor, as well as McElion and Elliott. With the aid of Whitten the policeman said he placed the men under arrest and closed the door with a police lock. In Water street, Sprague and McElion were each grasping a "long-neck" and these were taken from them as well as several bottles of liquor. A little more than \$4 was taken from McElion, who previous to this had thrown away a "square-face" in Water street.

None of the prisoners had any statement to make before being sent up for trial.

FIRST IN MARITIME PROVINCES

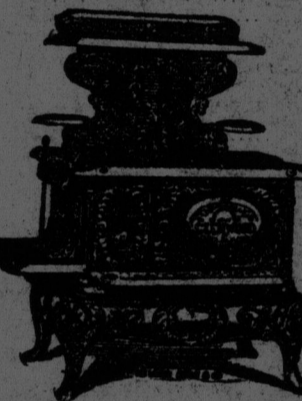
