

Ottawa, April 6.—A new tack of the opposition on the reciprocity issue developed in the commons today. A concerted demand for information as to comparative prices, cost of production, etc., in Canada and the United States of the commodities affected by the agreement was led by Mr. Perley. He asked for more light before the critics could intelligently discuss the tariff changes.

Hon. Mr. Fielding let in the light, but in a manner utterly disconcerting to his listeners, whose attempted shafts at the age of the minister of finance invariably came back on their own heads. It was one of the finest exhibitions of apt and crushing retort that parliament has heard this session.

In moving his amendment, the Conservative chief whistled the complaint of lack of information to determine "whether this reciprocity pact was going to result in good or evil." Mr. Perley maintained that it was the duty of the government to supply all the data called for in his resolution.

Hon. Mr. Fielding said he was somewhat surprised to find the new phase of the opposition to reciprocity took no note of the matters which a few days ago were the principal stock in trade.

The division was taken at 11 o'clock and resulted in the defeat of Mr. Perley's amendment by 34, the vote being 64 to 38. It was a straight party affair with the ex-

ception of one vote, and this was the vote of Mr. Sifton. He was the first man to vote for the amendment and the first man to follow him was the opposition leader.



LIEUT-GOVERNOR GIVES**HIS ASSENT IN HOUSE TO FIFTY-NINE BILLS****Election Matters Subject of Legislation to Be Taken up—Yesterday's Business in Legislature**

Fredericton, April 6.—Fifty-nine bills were assented to this evening by the lieutenant-governor, after which the house settled down to consideration of other bills that had been recommended.

Among the measures that did not reach the house was one to amend the election act providing for pure elections. There are many members on both sides of the house anxious to see this part of the election law strengthened, but the bill before them was considered to be of an imperfect and incomplete character. While it provided that when twenty-five electors made affidavit that there had been corrupt practices one or two judges would be appointed to investigate the same and the attorney-general would then be called upon to prosecute the offenders, if upon investigation it was found that there had been violation of the act.

Members of the committee did not think that it would be pleasant or desirable to ask the attorney-general to prosecute, and it was decided to ask those who presented the bill of Westmorland Electoral Reform League to be represented before the committee.

Fredericton, N. B., April 6.—Hon. Mr. Hazen introduced a bill to amend the act respecting juries. He explained that the main purpose of the bill was to make it unnecessary to summon a grand jury unless for a circuit court, and there was criminal business before the court.

The bill to amend the dental act was agreed to with amendments, placing the fees at 85c.

The house went into committee with Mr. Sproul in the chair, and agreed to a bill to amend the liquor license act, with amendments to make it clear that the \$5 deposit paid the inspectors on making the application for licenses shall go in with the balance of the bill, and also making provisions in the act regarding the adjustment of liquor license funds and the payment of expenses.

The bill to consolidate and amend the public health act and acts in amendment of and in addition thereto was considered.

The corporations committee met again this afternoon. The bill to further amend the act incorporating the Imperial Drydock Company of St. John was agreed to; the bill to incorporate the Bel River Light, Heat & Power Company was further considered. Amendments were made whereby the company could not expropriate lands without the consent of the lieutenant-governor-in-council; expropriation could not take place until the lands were paid for. A new resolution was inserted providing that the company shall be permitted to export power to the United States provided that upon one year's notice by a Canadian company, desirous of purchasing power, this company shall supply power to the applicant. The bill was agreed to as amended.

April Canada Monthly

"Three billion four hundred million dollars' worth of nitrogen is required to produce a single harvest in the United States, reckoning the chemical at its present price of 16c. cents a pound. Does it get to you?" asks Rex Crosswell, in the first of a series of three articles on "Money-Mad Farming," the first one of which heads April Canada Monthly (formerly Canada-West), and which sounds a note of warning to western Canadian farmers. Mr. Crosswell says what every scientific farmer knows, that it takes nitrogen to grow wheat—lots of it—and that the farmers of the great wheat-producing areas of the United States in their eagerness to get rich quickly have shipped out wheat year after year and with it shipped out the fertility of the soil until after twenty years of continuous wheat-cropping they have cut down their yields from thirty and forty bushels to a miserably ten or fifteen.

Mr. Crosswell's remedy for this is nitrogen-restoring crops of legumes—alfalfa, clover, field peas or vetches every fourth year. His argument seems convincing and will at least bear consideration from the farmer, whether he grows wheat alone or is a mixed-farming advocate.

WHERE THE SEA IS DEEPEST

(From Harpers Weekly)

The ocean has been sounded in nearly all directions with modern appliances and these soundings show that the floor of the ocean consists of vast undulating mountains lying at an average depth of about two and a half miles beneath the surface of the waves. In some places huge ridges and cone rise from these submerged plains to within a few hundred fathoms of the sea surface, and the rise above the surface as volcanic islands and coral atolls.

The greatest depth hitherto recorded is in the Challenger (or Nero) Deep in the north Pacific—2229 fathoms. In Mount Everest were placed in this deep 2000 feet of water would roll over the peak of this highest mountain in the world.

The greatest depth in the Atlantic is in the Nares Deep between the West India Islands and Bermuda—4002 fathoms.



