The sealing voyage of 1924 closed on May 7th, when the Ranger and Viking finished discharging their catches. Although the outlook was gloomy at the beginning of the season it gradually grew better and an increase of 25,000 was made above last year. The grand total catch is as follows:

Her Majesty noticed his tie pin—the rose of York presented to his father—who was pilot of the "Ophir" when the King and Queen visited Newfoundland some years ago as Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York. His Majesty remembered the incident and was very gracious and happy to meet the son of the late Pilot of the Ophir, and so the award of the C. L. B. as a treasured souvenir.
