On the morning of November 18th Russian batteries bombarded Chailina, where Japanese entrenchments were observed, and at 8 o'clock an artillery engagement took place with the Japanese batteries. The Russian losses were four killed and two wounded.

Mukden, Nov. 19.—The position at the front is unchanged. Positive information received here contradicts previous reports, and says that the Japanese have decided not to begin a serious operation on Mukden before there is a definite result at Port Arthur.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 20.—1.40 a.m.—The war office announced late to-night that it had no further dispatches regarding the fighting near Mukden. In the absence of official dispatch press telegrams are regarded as evidence that important developments are in progress, and it is not improbable that a general engagement is going on.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 19.—General Kouropatkin, in a dispatch dated November 17th, reports that November 14th and 15th passed in quietness. He adds that the nights are cold, but that overcoats have been issued and the general condition of the troops is excellent.
