FIFTEEN MISSING AND FIFTY INJURED IN RAILWAY WRECK

PITTSBURG, Pa., Feb. 23.—The Pennsylvania special, the Pennsylvania Railroad between New York and Chncago, was wrecked a few minutes after midnight today while rounding a sharp curve at Black Diamon, Pa., about seven miles east of Johnstown.

The alarm was immediately given, and notwithstanding that the central fire station was only a stone's throw away, it was nearly fifteen minutes before water could be obtained, the hydrant being frozen. Not a thing was saved, excepting some of the office books.
