## SAYS HE SET TRAP FOR DOCTOR AND HIS WIFE

Now Paterson Man Sues Physician for \$20,000 Damages.

PATERSON, N.J., Dec. 31.—Dr. Victor B. Bullion, of this city, has been made defendant in a suit for \$20,000 damages for alienation of the affections of Mrs. Oscar Indelber. The suit was begun by the woman's husband, who charged that six weeks ago he told his wife he would be away from home for several days. He had suspected the physician, he alleged, of having supplanted him in the affections of Mrs. Indelber and set a trap for him. Instead of going away, the husband and friend atched the house. They say they saw the physician enter. They broke into the place, and it is charged, found the doctor in the wife's room.

The physician said the suit was one of blackmail. He said that Mrs. Indelber had been a patient of his for two years. On the night in question, he went to the house, and he was asked asking him to call on her. He went to the house and was questioning the woman when the husband and friend entered. Dr. Bullion asserted also that before the papers in the suit were served on him the husband had offered to settle the case.

## NOTCHED STONES CLEW TO TREASURE CACHE

Relics Which May Have Been Left by Spanish Explorers Found in Oklahoma.

Prospectors Think Survivors of Indian Massacre Returned and Recovered Buried Gold.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Dec. 29.—In several small, peculiar shaped stones, all with six notches hacked on one side at regular distances, the Oklahoma Indians and a way of life that always has been a disputed question. It has been contended that there is gold in the Wichita Mountains and in some places in the eastern part of the state.

It is a fact that evidences of mining exist in various places in the eastern and western parts of the southern portion of the state. Many stories have been told of how the Spaniards made expeditions from their far southern home to the Indian country seeking gold and silver. There are fragments of facts in all.

T. Shillite stones, with their peculiar notches, now in the museum of the Oklahoma Historical Society, have a story that, could it be revealed, would give up some historical incidents not without romance.

These stones were sent by H. L. Stein, of Manhattan, Kan., connected with the Oklahoma Historical Society. With them Mr. Stein gave an explanation of how he found the stones and his story is an interesting one.

HOW HE FOUND THE STONES.

"In the years 1884, 1885 and 1886," says Mr. Stein, "I was occupied in locating minerals in Arkansas and the Cherokee Creek and Choctaw nations in the Indian Territory. In the spring of 1886 I became acquainted with Mr. W. J. Davis, of Fort Smith, Ark. We arranged to visit the Indian Territory in search of the minerals, as we had been sent either the dogs or the wagon, I imagined a ride would mean a slow drag around the block, and I looked forward to it with some hesitancy.

Each dog, as his or her name was mentioned, thumped acknowledgement with a beautiful brush of a tail. Mrs. Hannum had no idea of using the dogs for driving purposes when she first brought them to the city, but after she had been here she was dismayed to find she could not possibly exercise them in the usual manner.
