Opinion of Sir James Grant, M. D., K. C. M. G., expressed at the meeting of the Medical Council held in Toronto on July 5th, 1912.

In connection with the campaign against liquors, Sir James made a plea for the working classes. While it was, he said, an established fact that the use of strong intoxicating, alcoholic beverages, such as whisky and brandy, had done much to promote tuberculosis by lowering the vitality of the persons who took them, Lager and mild ale were forms of liquid beefsteak, which undoubtedly imparted power and strength to the system. He could not see why the laboring man should be deprived of this needful stimulant, and argued that care ought to be shown in legislating against liquors, thus to protect the working classes.



# KELLY'S SON

All papers relating to Law Be Courts Tender taken from office so police, could secure no evidence.

Winnipeg, Nov. 4—That most of the papers in the office of Thomas Kelly & Sons relating to the law courts contract were removed by Maurice Kelly, a son of Thomas Kelly, was the evidence in the law courts enquiry this morning of Roy L. Worthington, estimator for the Kelly firm.

The papers were removed about the first of October during Worthington's absence, and Maurice Kelly told Worthington he had burned some and taken others to Detroit. Documents relating to Kelly's sub-contract for cut atone were left, but all papers in connection with the Kelly firm's tender for the law courts were missing, said the witness.

Maurice Kelly told Worthington that he had taken the papers so that is the event of another search by the fice such as for the parliamentary building contract no evidence would be found. Correspondence relating to the law courts had been taken from the letter files. Isaac Pitblado, crown counsel, intimated that the Kelly firm had entered two tenders for the law courts. Worthington said he knew nothing of two. He prepared the estimate and the firm entered the tender at \$837,000, but declined to sign the contract at that figure when it was offered them. Worthington said hat recently he had talked with Lawrence Kelly, son of Thomas Kelly and member of the company, and told him the original estimates were likely to be asked for at the enquiry.

Lawrence replied that the crowd had no right to ask for them: That at any rate they would not be produced.

"So far as Thomas Kelly & Sons are concerned it looks as though there were some reasons for the removal of these documents," said Mr. Pitblado. "Some cogent reason," agreed the commissioner.

Did it of His Own Accord.

Maurice Kelly, aged 20, 2 son of Thomas Kelly, and partner of a stonoith's standing, in the firm of Thomas Kelly & Sons, told the law recourts commission this afternoon that early in September he took a large quantity of documents from the office of the Kelly Company to his house, with the sent part of them to the family cottage at Detroit, Minn., and that he balance in the furnace. He said that he did not know what papers he burned, and he used no plan in separating those to be saved from those to be destroyed.

Kelly's explanation of his act was that he was nervous, alone, and he awanted to make sure that if the authorities made another search of the company's office they would find nothing. The search of the Kelly offices for papers relating to the parliament buildings' contracts had occurred shortly before, and Maurice Kelly said he was indignant over that occurrence. "I decided," he said, "that the office was no safe place for anything, the way the attorney-general's department was acting."

The witness declared that he had no instructions from anyone to secure the papers. "I did it of my own ac-

instructions from anyone to secure the papers. "I did it of my own accord," he said, "and I got the deuce for it from my father and my two brothers."

## SACKVILLE LIGHTING.

The hearing in the matter of the Eastern Electric and Development Company was continued yesterday before the Public Utilities Commission. Evidence was given by Kenneth Pickard regarding the affairs of the company, several matters of a technical nature being dealt with in connection with the protest of the people of Sackville against certain proposed limitations in the use of electric power during the day time. Robert Carter, of Halifax was also examined respecting matters on the record of the hearings at previous sessions.

Private William McClair, of the 64th Battalion, who has been stationed here for the past two months, engaged in recruiting work, left yesterday morning for Sussex, to join his regiment before leaving for Halifax for the winter. With him went a little black and white kitten which has been for the last two or three weeks a member of the recruiting office staff. Mr. Cat made the trip to the station in "Billy's" pocket, and when last seen was sitting on the window sill of the car, looking at the scenery.

The McClair's departure leaves Ptes. Walter and Fred Shaw in charge of the work here. Walter Shaw seems to be a born recruiting officer. He gets almost every man he tackles, and he seems to have a pretty good idea who to tackle. He has had the best results of any of the men who have been stationed here in the work, and his goud as a capwasser for recruits is not to be found in the city.
