

WILL NOT TRY TO USURP WORK OF CHURCHES

John D. Rockefeller, Jr., says big philanthropic institutions have no idea of doing so, and public would not tolerate.

New York, Jan. 27.—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., ended his testimony before the United States Commission on Industrial Relations today by sketching, in a general way, the purposes of the Rockefeller Foundation, and its methods of operation. He admitted that there was an element of possible danger in large foundations being able to impart the views of the men behind them to the younger generations, through educational institutions. He also admitted it was possible that such foundations might exercise an influence upon the liberalism of the country, as was done in Germany, he said, by the militarists. The safe-guard, he asserted, lies in the legislative bodies and the spirit of the American people.

Before Mr. Rockefeller left the witness stand, which he had occupied all yesterday and the day before, he told the Commission that he sincerely hoped its efforts would develop real improvements in the relations between capital and labor, and aid in the general betterment of the condition of the workers.

New York, Jan. 27.—The possible danger that the great philanthropic foundations, with their immense resources, might seek to dominate the country, as the German militarist idea has done since 1870, was suggested to John D. Rockefeller, Jr., today at the investigation that is being conducted into the activities of the foundations by the Federal Commission on Industrial Relations.

Such an effort, Mr. Rockefeller said, would never be made because, in the first place, the people of the United States would never tolerate such a thing, and secondly, the foundations had no such idea. Their sole purpose, he said, was to bring about better conditions.

Miss Belle Zilberman, who was arrested last summer for the Standard Oil building at 25 Broadway, while taking part in the so-called mourners parade, as a protest by the Industrial Workers of the World against the shooting of miners at Ludlow, greeted Mr. Rockefeller today when he reached the City Hall where the hearings are held. Yesterday she said she "forgave Mr. Rockefeller" for having her arrested. Today she brought him a "message of good will." Mr. Rockefeller shook hands and chatted with her for several minutes.

FORMER ST. JOHN MAN ELECTED IN ST. STEPHEN

Wm. F. Higgins polls big vote in Aldermanic fight — F. Parker Grimmer, Mayor without opposition

St. Stephen, Jan. 27.—The smoke of battle has cleared for the town elections held today and nothing remains but the shouting. F. Parker Grimmer had been returned as Mayor without opposition at the nominations of Monday. Each ward elects two councillors and the following is the result of the voting held today:
Queens ward—Thos. Toal, 161; Wm. McVay, 99; Andrew DeWolfe, 61; James Marryat, 47.
Kings Ward—Wm. F. Higgins, 140; Leroy Hill, 90; A. A. Malloy, 89.
Dukes Ward—David Johnson, 88; F. D. J. Graham, 75; J. R. Polley, 52.
The surprise of the election was the very large vote polled by Mr. Higgins in the middle ward, where he was running against a ticket that had on it one of the members of the council of last year. Mr. Higgins came here from St. John less than four years ago, and has been a live wire in all matters handled by the Board of Trade, but this was his first venture into town politics. Mr. Graham and Mr. Toal were members of the board last year.
The other men elected are all new members.

KING'S COUNTY COUNCIL

Sussex objects to proposition of assessment — Request refused.

Hampton, N. B., Jan. 27.—At this morning's session of the Kings County Council the newly revised and consolidated by-laws were approved and the lists of parish officers approved. It was resolved to memorialize the government to amend the act providing for the appointment of commissioners of the Municipal Home so as to admit of commissioners being appointed by the municipality. The list of lumber surveys was passed.

A strong delegation from Sussex complained of the rate of assessment on the town property as compared with the rest of the parish, and asked that the council order a new valuation or that the rate be reduced from one-sixth of the total valuation to one-tenth. The council decided not to comply with either request.

It was ordered that 4,000 copies of the revised by-laws be published in a pamphlet.
For municipal home \$65, for pauper lunatics \$52; for each lunatic, \$11.11; for contingent fund, \$7,500; for school fund, \$6,250. No action was taken on the proposal of the government to increase the grant to institutions for the blind in Nova Scotia.

COUNTY COURT HELD AT NEWCASTLE

Newcastle, Jan. 27.—County Court was held here yesterday. His Honor Judge McLatchey presiding. There were no criminal cases, and only one civil case—R. G. Lawlor vs. Fred Carvell. The latter was a suit for return of \$300, deposit to take up an option for Black Foxes. Plaintiff's lawyer was Hon. L. J. Tweedie, with Robert Murray for the defence. The jury—Messrs. J. W. Vanderbeck, Derby, foreman; Holoban, Chaplin Island Road; W. Baldwin, Douglasfield; Thos. Lynch, Nelson, and Wm. Burns, Blackville. Decided in favor of the plaintiff, and court adjourned.

BERLIN GAY FOR BIRTHDAY OF KAISER

London, Jan. 27.—Emperor William's birthday today, although with a degree of solemnity which would not have been expected in times of peace. A Reuter despatch from Berlin describing the celebration. The city was decked with flags. Members of the diplomatic corps, court officials and representatives of the state and municipal governments attended a service at the Cathedral. Crown Princess Cecilie and Prince August Wilhelm attended the service, and were cheered enthusiastically. A reception was held later in the City Hall.

The Emperor's birthday was celebrated generally in the other cities of the Empire. Religious services were held at the headquarters of Emperor William, where the Emperor delivered an address, expressing his satisfaction with the progress of the war, and in which he asked his officers to continue to discharge their duties to the Emperor and the Fatherland, as they hitherto had done.

The Berlin papers including the Socialists, published warm eulogies of the Emperor, and predict that he will emerge from the war not only victorious, but with his reputation considerably enhanced. The Empress Augusta Victoria sent a long, affectionately worded telegram to the Emperor. As a birthday present she forwarded him a cover for a field altar, designed by herself.

Emperor William received telegrams of congratulations during the day from Emperor Francis Joseph and the Sultan of Turkey.

TOOK OVER 14 MILLIONS OF POUNDS LAST WEEK — ENGLAND CAME THIRD WITH 3,489,437 POUNDS.

Washington, Jan. 27.—Copper exports for the week ended January 23 amounted to \$5,050,001, or \$2,011,550 more than shown for the preceding week. The total exports of copper for the week ended January 23, according to reports from the ten principal customs districts, announced tonight by the Department of Commerce. The total export last week was 23,057,055 pounds, against 7,836,759 the preceding week.

France was the principal purchaser of copper from United States markets last week, 14,927,332 pounds being transported to France. Italy was second with 4,114,324 pounds, and England was third with 3,489,437 pounds. During the eight weeks ended January 23, 93,396,426 pounds of copper, worth \$12,001,006, were exported.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years, renewable at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,560 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton. In unsurveyed territory the tract must be staked out by the applicant in person, and a person application to the Agent or sub-Agent of Dominion Lands for the district. All claims must be made within thirty days after filing application.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over, having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500.00 has been expended the claim may be renewed for the first year must be paid to the agent within thirty days after filing application.

PLACING MINING CLAIMS are 500 feet long and from 1,000 to 2,000 feet wide. Entry fee, \$5. Not less than \$100 must be expended in development work each year. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead, or a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A homesteader is required to erect a residence where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$20.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years. A homesteader must have a patent less 50 acres; extra cultivation. Pre-emption of land must be made as soon as homesteaded patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rounded scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
