GEORGE THE FIFTH, by the Grace
of God of the United Kingdom
of Great Britain and Ireland, and
of the British Dominions beyond
the Seas, King, Defender of the
Faith, Emperor of India.

**TO All to Whom These Presents Shall
Come, or Whom the Same may
Concern:—Greeting:—**
PROCLAMATION
WHEREAS, it has been made clear
that an adequate supply of foodstuffs
to Great Britain and her Allies is now
one of the most critical and essential
problems in connection with carrying
the war to a triumph;
And Whereas, Our Province of New
Brunswick, by virtue of its geographical
situation in comparative proximity
to the Motherland, occupies a position
of special responsibility and opportu-
nity;
And Whereas, the season approaches
which shall determine for another year
the amount of foodstuffs which this
Province shall produce;
We, therefore, believing it to be the
aspiration of our people to discharge
every responsibility as in the past,
and confident of their willingness to
take advantage of the opportunity in-
volved, to the end that the cause of
righteousness for which we struggle
may be advanced, have thought fit, by
and with the advice of our Executive
Council for our Province of New
Brunswick, to appoint, and do hereby
appoint, with full powers, to the
preparation for the period of production
approaching, beginning on the
fifteenth April instant.
And we do hereby urge and request
that the County Council of each and
every County of Our Province of New
Brunswick be convened in special Ses-
sion on Saturday, the thirteenth April
instant, to consider ways and means
to stimulate or assist in the maximum
production of essential foodstuffs in
the respective Counties.
And we do hereby further urge and
request that each and every Clergy-
man in Our Province of New Brun-
swick shall, from his pulpit on Sunday,
the fourteenth of April instant, set
forth the facts of the food situation
as it affects the Allied cause, empha-
sizing the responsibility resting on this
favoured land, and invoking the bless-
ing of Almighty God on the human
efforts put forth towards production,
that they may be increased by Him who
alone giveth the increase.
And we do hereby still further urge
and request the careful consideration
and patriotic co-operation of all our
people in the matters herein set forth.
All of which premises all our loving
subjects and all others whom it doth
or may in anywise concern, are here-
by required to take notice and govern
themselves accordingly.
In testimony whereof we have caused
these Our Letters to be made by
Patent, and the Great Seal of Our
Province of New Brunswick to be
hereunto affixed.

of our Lord, one thousand nine

**GRAND DUCHY BADEN
WANTS RAIDS STOPPED**
Amsterdam, April 14.—A Karlsruhe
despatch to the Frankfurter Zeitung
reports the passage by the Chamber of
the Grand Duchy of Baden there of a
resolution requesting the Imperial Ger-
man government to endeavor to se-
cure a general agreement for the occa-
sion of hostile air raids on places out-
side the zone of military operations.

**LIBERIA FIGURES IN
WAR QUITE ACTIVELY**
London, April 13.—The German sub-
marine which on April 10 bombarded
Monrovia, capital of the African re-
public of Liberia, in addition to de-
stroying the wireless telegraph sta-
tion, sank the Liberian armed vessel,
President Grant. A number of casu-
alties were inflicted on shore by the
shells from the U-boat.

After a bombardment lasting an
hour, the activities of the submarine
were interrupted by a coastal steamer.

**AMSTERDAM, APRIL 13.—The German
battleship Rheinland, which was re-
ported to have struck a mine and sunk
has not gone down, according to a
Berlin despatch. She is said to have
been stranded near the Aland Is-
lands, in the Baltic, in a fog on Wed-
nesday, and efforts are being made
to refloat her.**
