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Less than four years ago, when the sense of economic grievance that rankled in the hearts of North Dakota's farmers had been fanned to a flame by the refusal of the legislature to establish a State-owned terminal grain-elevator, a man named Arthur C. Townley jumped into a small hired automobile and began by a farm-to-farm canvass the organization of the Non-Partizan League. For months the old line politicians regarded this "flivver campaign" as a joke, but today they see Mr. Townley's league of farmers grown to a membership of more than 200,000 with a political organization in thirteen states, representation in the U. S. Congress, and completely in control of North Dakota's government.

The St. Paul Dispatch terms the league "the most revolutionary political machine that ever gain-ed complete autocratic control of legislative affairs in any state in the Union," while the Minneapolis Tribune speaks of it as "Townleyism, the political prairie fire that is now raging in North Dakota and spreading to surrounding states," but as the New York World reminds us "North Dakota and her people will pay the bill and the rest of the country will profit by the demonstration. 
