

UNIONISTS OF ULSTER CHOOSE SIR JAS. GRANT

Irishman of Brilliant Career
Will be Leader of the
New Party.

CARSON APPEALS FOR GET-TOGETHER POLICY

Policeman Shot Dead in At-
tack Made Near Dublin
Again.

Belfast, Feb. 4.—The Ulster Union-
ist Council today elected Sir James
Craig, M.P., leader of the party in
the new parliament to be set up for
Ulster under the Irish home rule act.
Sir Edward Carson presided over the
council session.

Carson Advises Moderation.

Sir Edward Carson, in a speech here
last night to his constituents said that
what was going on in South and West
Ireland made a man ashamed of being
an Irishman. He appealed to those
"at the back of this horrible drama,"
to call a halt and confer with the gov-
ernment. Sir Edward added that if
the government of Ireland bill had
not given Ulster an absolute victory
it was a declaration that Ulster's past
services, and her loyalty and progress
was such that no government was en-
titled to take away her independence
and place her under a government
which she would detest and abhor.
The speaker concluded by saying that
while he could not accept the Ulster
leadership he had undertaken to hold
the fort at Westminster, and help to
bring about a closer union with Great
Britain than ever before.

Dublin, Feb. 4.—At Ballbrigan a po-
liceman named Samuel Greene, was
shot and killed yesterday.

The New Leader.

Belfast, Feb. 4.—The election of Sir
James Craig as the first premier of the
new Ulster parliament means the vir-
tual retirement of Sir Edward Carson
from his long standing leadership of
"the loyal people of the six counties."

Sir James has been in the Imperial
parliament since 1906. He was the
right hand man of Sir Edward Carson
during the home rule crisis, which was
suspended by the dramatic interven-
tion of the war.

Sir James, who was made a baronet
in January, 1918, for war services, was
born at Stranddown, County Down,
Jan. 8, 1872. He served in both the
South African war and the European
war.

Three ministerial posts have been
occupied by him. He was treasurer of

now on. It will be, just as always.

Justice Dept. Considers Imprisoned Labor Heads

If Manitoba Members Are Not
Released at Once Legislature
May Make Petition.

Winnipeg, Feb. 4.—Premier Melch-
on in a reply to a request that Labor
members of the provincial legislature
imprisoned on charges of seditious
conspiracy be released in time for the
opening of the House, states that the
matter has been referred to the de-
partment of Justice for action. F. J.
Dixon, leader of the Labor Party, re-
ceived the reply today.

If the federal government does not
release the men, the Labor group in
the legislature, it is stated, intends to
place a resolution before the House
calling for support of all members in
a petition to be forwarded to the fed-
eral authorities for the release of the
Labor leaders.

RUSSIAN DANCER HOPELESSLY INSANE

Oil Consumption Made New Record

U. S. in 1920 Used 531,186,
000 Barrels—Produced Only
443,402,000.

Washington, Feb. 4.—Oil production
in the United States in 1920 totaled
443,402,000 barrels, while consumption
of oil in this country reached the un-
precedented total of 531,186,000 barrels.
Despite the excess of consumption
over production, the end of the year
showed a net increase in petroleum
stocks of more than 10,000,000 barrels.

The figures on oil for 1920 were an-
nounced today by the Geological Sur-
vey in a preliminary survey. The total
production estimated, the survey
said, probably would be increased
when the amount of oil consumed on the
leases is known and after allow-
ance is made for net changes in
stocks held by producers on the lease,
but as it stands it represents a gain of
17 per cent, as compared with 1919
and of 70 per cent, as compared with
1913.

Exports of petroleum in 1920
amounted to 106,175,000 barrels, more
than double the imports of 1919 and
almost five times greater than the im-
ports in 1913.
