(Continued from page 1) In contrast with the attitude of the Liberal opposition, the government came on fearlessly and made its declaration on the tariff, said the Prime Minister. The government stood for the tariff which existed today. "We want protection in this country, the same as every country in the world has it, with the exception of Great Britain," he said. "Great Britain is coming round to it pretty fast."

Disaster For Canada. It would be disastrous on the eve of a tariff revision in the United States for Canada to make any changes. The budget as presented by the finance minister had met with the general approval of the country.

I. T. Facand (Merquitt) said that the future of the Dominion depended upon the House of Commons executing the will of the people. The government have a mandate to justify them in undertaking their grave responsibilities. If Canada was to make any headway and this had been done in an aboriginal manner, it was necessary to clear the deck for action, open a new chapter in history, and put in a strong government fresh from a popular victory and with a clear mandate for policies that had been discussed before and accepted by the people.

A Double Picture. The amendment to the budget gave expression to the principles of Liberalism on fiscal matters. It recalled a double picture. First, the fiscal policy of this government, and secondly, the Liberal policy which had given to this country its happiness and prosperity.

R. K. Anderson (Haiton), speaking from the government side, advocated a policy of moderate protection which the said was favored by the majority of the people. He was in favor of admitting immigrants from the British Isles and Northern Europe, holding that the doubling of Canada's population in the next quarter of a century was the solution of the railway problem.

J. A. Maharg (Manie Creek), took sharp exception to the remarks of the prime minister regarding the Progressive party and issued a challenge to the government to put the matter to the test of a general election. The Progressives would be satisfied with the result.

In the Senate. The bill to abolish the commission of conservation was read a second time in the Senate this afternoon. In proposing the passage of the bill, Sir James Loughheed said that the commission had extended its scope and activities, until it threatened to usurp the powers and functions of the government itself. It invaded the field of agriculture, dipped into external affairs by making representations at Washington, invaded the Department of the Interior by meddling with the administration of natural resources, took up the question of water powers; extended its scope to the Department of Marine and Fisheries; dipped down under the earth and interfered with mines and minerals; and finally took a hand in the question of scientific and industrial research. The consequences were not only duplication, but rivalry with the civil service.

Robs Others of Credit. The commission had, by propaganda, tried to take credit for the work of others, thus engendering a bad spirit. Senator Heston held that the government was responsible for the work of the commission, and if there had been so much overlapping in its action, it would have been better. He believed that the commission had an advantage in regard to co-operation with the prov-

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BOOZE RAIDS BEGINNING OF BIG EXPOSURE

Officials Declare Smuggling Embraces the Entire Atlantic Coast.

MANY ARRESTS ARE ANTICIPATED

Vessels Carrying Booze Make Quick Runs to Small Islands.

Atlantic City, May 13.—As the result of the raids here in which liquor valued at \$15,000 was seized, a gigantic smuggling plot is said to be on the verge of exposure. The system of operations, involving millions of dollars worth of foreign booze, is believed to extend along the entire seaboard from Florida to Maine.

This was learned from customs agents who assert that prominent in many coast cities are involved, and that the evidence they now have in their possession will create a big stir when the government machinery moves. A number of arrests are expected within the next few days. There are many suspects under surveillance by customs agents in a dozen cities between Maine and Florida, officials said here tonight.

The raids here on a boat house and later aboard the ship Henry Berks, commanded by Captain Harry Gaultier, are just a flash in the pan to what might be expected, it is stated.

In Customs Hands. The approaching roundup is entirely in the hands of the customs officials, who say they have evidence that steamships have been bringing in liquor from foreign ports toward the Atlantic coast and have been enabled to unload the big cargoes through the fleet of schooners, speedy auxiliary boats and similar craft constantly following mackerel and other fish now running outside the three-mile limit. These craft, making quick runs into little frequented inlets have been met by agents on land, who, through others, have previously arranged for the sale of the liquor, permitting of quick delivery and quick disposal under the cover of darkness. The boats used to land the liquor from the parent craft, scatter up and down the coast, never landing at a point close to the scene where the liquors were lightered.

"There is no doubt of a most complete and extensive smuggling system covering the coast from Florida to Maine," said Charles R. Kurtz, surveyor of customs of the eleventh district, which covers Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware and part of New York.

The capture of 5,000 bottles of stuff here, which in the check-up was made today, in making formal confiscation, we estimate to be worth between \$70,000 and \$80,000, is but a drop in the bucket. The big game these men have been taking is startling in its proportions.

Every bottle of rum seized thus far has been of foreign make, Mr. Kurtz says, verifying clues upon which they have been working for weeks along the coast.

Senator Loughheed said that where it was possible to absorb the staff, it will be done. This is now under consideration.

Germans Ready To Attack Polish Forces

Clash is Expected Within a Week—Poles Neither Advance or Retreat.

Oppeln, May 13.—German forces on the left bank of the Oder river are being gradually augmented by the arrival of former soldiers from Breslau and a number, it is known, are coming from Germany. Several hundred security police from Hamburg and Kiel and a few from other German cities, have reached Brieg, 20 miles northwest of here, and are authoritatively reported to have placed themselves at the disposal of German authorities there.

There are rumors here that the Germans will take the offensive probably within a week, when their preparations are complete. The Poles in the meantime, are known to be strengthening their positions with artillery, although they are not advancing.

French sources declare that Korfanty, leader of the Polish insurrection, has needed General Leron's instructions for the first time and suspended his offensive.

The French deprecate statements published by the Poles that the Allies have accepted the present battle lines as the new frontier between Germany and Poland. They declare these statements tend to excite the German population, making re-establishment of order more difficult.

A German counter offensive, it is believed, cannot be prevented unless the Poles evacuate their positions, the impression prevailing among German leaders that if the Poles are permitted to hold territory they have occupied, the Germans would have similar rights, should they succeed in driving out the invaders, and occupying the same region themselves.

The inter-allied committee is holding frequent conferences, but it's said there is no intention to reinforce Allied troops here.

Police May Have Killed Fugitive

Bones Found in Woods Thought to Indicate Five Year Old Tragedy.

Sherbrooke, Que., May 13.—The discovery of the skeleton of a man in the vicinity of Coleraine station, Montserrat county, has aroused considerable interest throughout the Eastern Townships.

It is believed the skeleton is that of William Arthur Baker, better known to local residents as "Johnny Baker," who disappeared on Friday, August 14, 1914, after he had been apprehended by the late Constable Moe and Smith.

Johnny Baker and his wife, Mena Barrick, were accused of breaking in on the summer cottage of Herbert Jacques at North Hatley and stealing silver and copper wares, electric fixtures, etc.

Fled From Arrest. High Constable Moe and Lieut. Smith left for Coleraine, armed with the warrant and went to the Mercer Hotel, where the accused were sitting. They were refused admittance to the room, but finally succeeded in entering and found their party waiting for them. Baker broke loose, made a rush for the stairs and ran out into the woods, making his escape. A continued search was made for Baker, but all in vain. There had been considerable amount of rain around this period, and as the accused pursued clothes and hatless into the depths of the woods, it is alleged that several shots were fired after him, and it is presumed that one or more of them reached their mark and seriously injured him.

SINN FEINERS ARE NOMINATED

Belfast, May 13.—Nominations for the two Irish parliaments were carried out today. No contests were reported for the southern parliament and the only imperialists nominated outside Belfast were four for Trinity College, Dublin, which means five Republicans will virtually have a walk-over in the south.

For the northern parliament forty Unionists, twenty Sinn Feiners, twelve Nationalists and five Socialists were nominated for the fifty-two seats.
