FREDERICTON.

Fredericton, May 8.—(Special)—Trial of the case of William H. Quinn vs. trustees of school district No. 5, A. parish of St. John's, was begun at an adjourned sitting of the York and Prince court this morning before Judge Gregory and a jury. The action is brought to recover \$475 from the trustees of the school district, who are Black, Bliss & Neale, as the plaintiff's agent. Mr. Quinn did not receive the money and desires the firm authority to receive payment of the money to him. Mr. Bliss has been on the stand all day under examination as to the course of dealings between Mr. Quinn and his firm. Byron Wines and A. J. Gregory, K. C., are acting for plaintiff; J. H. Barry, K. C., for defendant.

A. P. Rowan, who for the last six years has been associated with the business of the late W. H. Carter, intends to go to Winnipeg about the 1st of this month with Jack Tabery, who has resigned his position with George V. Dibblee for the same purpose.

WOODSTOCK.

Woodstock, May 9.—An important meeting of the town council was held last night, Mayor Belyea and all the council members present. The treasurer reported for April \$2,200 expenditures, \$381.86 receipts; debit bank balance \$10,917.86. Mayor Belyea stated that he had received a check from the provincial government for \$1,000, on an account which amount had been placed in the bank to reduce the bank debt.

Coun. Dibblee reported that the committee had made arrangements with the United Telephone Company for the use of five telephones in the town, and to transport town business over the line, through the county, and all the connections in the wires; the contract to bind any new company which might take over the United Telephone Company.

The clerk was instructed to prepare a resolution of condolence on the death of J. R. Garter, engineer of the pumping station, for presentation to the relatives. John Tattersall was appointed chief of the fire department with the same salary as last year.

Several gentlemen from the board of directors were present and addressed the council, on the advisability of making concessions to enable the Medicus Mfg. Company to establish its plant in Woodstock; this company expects about \$30,000 stock; this company expects about \$30,000 stock; and it would mean an addition of 25 families to the town.
