TARIFF BILL READY FOR THE SENATE

Duties Lower Than House Planned
No Other Legislation to be Taken Up
Is Disposed Of

Hope to Put New Rates Into Effect October 1—All but Two Democrats Expected to Vote as a Unit for the Measure.

(Canadian Press.)
Washington, July 3.—After three months tinkering, the Democratic tariff revision at last is on the way for launching in the senate. The Democratic caucus of the senate late today approved the measure as revised. The finance committee and its own report and a final meeting of the committee will be held Saturday when the committee will bind the senators to its support. It is presented and adopted.


For the first time in history, the bill as it comes through the senate is expected to be lower than the measure passed by the house. The total estimated revenue under the Underwood-Simmons measure is \$100,000,000 for the first year. It is \$100,000,000 greater than that of the bill as it comes through the house.

Another resolution adopted today directs the finance committee to expedite consideration of all requests for bringing up anything in the senate except the tariff bill. It is proposed to cut off all long speeches in the morning hour business of the senate and to delay the way clear for uninterrupted debate of the tariff measure until it has been passed. It also is proposed to hold sessions beginning at 11 o'clock, as soon as the debate begins and later to begin at 10 o'clock every day.

Some Changes in Schedules.
Some changes in the rates were made by the caucus today. Spool cotton thread, which the caucus put on the list, against the recommendation of the finance committee, was to be reconsidered, restored to the dutiable list at 15 per cent, ad valorem. Iron pipes were transferred to the free list.

The automobile schedule was changed, cars costing \$1,000 or less being made dutiable at 10 per cent, costing \$1,000 or more than \$1,000, 30 per cent, and cars costing more than \$1,500, 40 per cent.

CAN SEND TRUNKS BY FREIGHT NOW

Ottawa, July 3.—Henceforth trunks may be sent by freight on Canadian railways if corded securely. This means that the public won't have to pay express charges, which were referred to by Chairman Dryton at the railway commission this morning as enormous.

HE FELL FROM WHARF TO DIE IN EARLY MORN

Body Recovered Later But Has Not Been Identified
ONLY ONE CLUE

At 8:30 o'clock the body of a man drowned from the wharf in the rear of Moran's liquor store, British street, early this morning was recovered but remained unidentified. It was removed to the morgue. He was apparently between 30 and 35 years of age, sandy hair and mustache, rest of face clean shaven, about five feet ten inches in height and powerfully built. He wore a black coat and vest, light trousers, tan boots, linen collar and black bow tie. In his pockets were found seventy cents in silver, pocket, cuff studs and watch chain but no marks from which his identity could be learned.

THREATEN TO DIE IN BRITISH PRISON

Two Suffragettes Sentenced to Three Years' Hard Labor for Incendiarism Tell Judge They Will Hunger Strike and Not Accept Release or Leave—Sylvia Pankhurst Denies Authorities Again.

London, July 3.—Two militant suffragettes, Kitty Mason and Clara Elzabeth Green, were sentenced to the gaols today to three years' penal servitude each on the charge of setting fire to the stand on the street. Sylvia Pankhurst expressed regret that she was not arrested at that time, and said: "I am charged with inciting, I asked the public at Trafalgar square to go down Downing street and meet the cabinet. Downing street is a public thoroughfare. What right have the police to stop the public from going there to meet the cabinet?"

BALKAN STATES IN FIT TO A FINISH

Bulgarians Against Them All
Losses Have Resulted On Both Sides

(Canadian Press.)
London, July 3.—The condition of affairs in the Balkan rupture is extraordinary. The twenty-four hours which the Bulgarian government accorded to Greece and Serbia to cease operations have expired. During the same period Bulgaria undertook to obtain from hostilities in order to give Russia time to intervene in favor of peace. But hostilities are being carried on, on both sides, apparently with the ferocity characteristic of Balkan soldiers, and no declaration of war has yet been made. The respective diplomatic representatives are still at their posts.

Servians Admitted 6,000 Killed and Wounded in Three Days' Battle—Roumania Prepares to Take a Hand—Powers Unable to Stay the Conflict.

Washington, July 3.—Two short sessions today covering subjects from Wall Street operations to lemon growing in California, brought the senate lobby in Washington to a temporary end again. The committee adjourned tonight until Monday, when an effort will be made to clear the decks for the opening of the "Mullhall testimony" involving alleged lobbying operations by the National Association of Manufacturers.

Jack Johnson's \$30,000 BAIL BOND NOT FORFEITED
Chicago, July 3.—The government's application for forfeiture of the \$30,000 bond of Jack Johnson, the negro pugilist, to secure his appearance for trial October 18 was denied by federal Judge Carpenter here today.

Premier Borden and Hon. Mr. Fielding at St. Andrews
St. Andrews, N. B., July 3.—Two distinguished Canadians are now here enjoying the cool sea breeze. Premier Borden, who arrived by train today, and Hon. W. S. Fielding, who reached yesterday. Both have their wives with them. The premier hopes to enjoy a few days' golfing on St. Andrews famous links.

German Army Bill Adopted
Berlin, July 3.—The Reichstag adopted today the amendment bill which increases the peace strength of the German army by approximately 100,000 men and the measures for financing the army increases. Saxony's four representatives voted in the negative.

Army Worms in Nebraska
Nebraska City, July 3.—Farmers near here report considerable damage to the eye crop from army worms. This is the first time the worm has made its appearance in this section of the state for many years.

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
