## APPO KRISP LIMITED MEET DEL EGATES FROM THE TOWNS

Kentville, Oct. 8—The directors of Appo-Krisp, Limited, held a meeting at 1.30 this afternoon, to receive delegations from various towns and listened to their presentations concerning most favorable location for the new industry.

The principal points considered were: situation of plant, availability of apples required and wheat to be grown or imported, freight rates on the apples and wheat and on the finished product to provincial and foreign points, cost of hydro power, assessment, water privileges, etc., all of which were fully presented in written statements presented by the delegations. Windsor, by Town Manager Shanks; Wolfville, by C. H. Porter; Kentville, by R. H. Lamont; Middleton, by Fred E. Cox; Bridgetown, by Mayor Hicks; Annapolis by F. M. Whitman.

These statements were all read and a discussion followed.

Three directors of the company were present, T. P. Calkin, president, Colonel Robert Innes and H. H. Bligh.

A letter of regret, at not being able to be present, was received from director A. B. McMahon.

Mr. Calkin stated the directors would give full consideration to all the statements received. With Colonel Innes he considered the matter of freight rates in getting products to factory and outputs on the market as being of prime importance in the selection of a site.

All the towns have recognized the great importance of such an industry being of prime importance in the selection of a site.

Many other centres throughout the Annapolis Valley bid for the preference, including Wolfville, Windsor, Kentville, Bridgetown and Annapolis, but none of them had the natural advantages of our town.

The work of construction will commence next week, and will be rushed to completion with the least possible delay.

Several of the directors were in town Tuesday looking over the ground for a good site, and we understand the location will be on the property, across the tracks, north from the railway water tank.

To those who are not entirely familiar with the program to be followed in connection with the new industry, it might be well to mention that Appo-Krisp, Ltd., has secured the idea of using up all low grade, but sound apples that would not find the same ready market as the higher grade fruit.

This fruit, by means of different scientific processes through which it will pass, will be turned into a delicious fruit cereal or breakfast food, and will be in combination with wheat. The wheat best suited for the purpose being the soft grade as grown here. In this way two channels for farmers to realize on are opened up.

It is generally conceded throughout the Province of Nova Scotia that the establishment of the new Appo-Krisp factory will prove a great boon to the apple-growing industry.

Formerly great quantities of apples, because they were spotted or for some other reason, were not marketed. These, however, will all be taken care of by Appo-Krisp, Ltd., thus benefiting the growers and the province in general to a great extent.

There is still available a limited amount of stock in this company, and every citizen of Middleton and farmer in the surrounding district should procure at least one unit. It is a local industry, the only one of its kind in Canada, and should pay handsome dividends.
