FRANCE TO SIGN TURKISH PEACE
Hostilities To Cease in Asia Minor Between Two Nations.

LONDON, March 2.—Peace will be signed, probably tomorrow, between France and the Turkish Nationalists, it was learned here today. The signing will take place in Paris.

Instructions already have been telegraphed by the delegates here of the Ankara Government of Mustafa Kemal Pasha and by the French Government for the cessation of hostilities. The terms of the treaty are not yet known, but an important point is French evacuation of Cilicia, Asia Minor (the Adana district).

The Turkish delegations, both of the Ankara and the French Governments, have received instructions to accept the Allied proposal for a commission to investigate the population claims of the Greeks and the Turks in the Smyrna district and in Thrace.

FERGUSON CLASHES WITH RANEY
IN DISCUSSING TIMBER PROBE
Attorney-General Says Peter White, Conservative Party Counsel At Timber Inquiry, Was Dismissed For "Insolence and Truculence" in Letters to the Department—Ferguson Terms the Probe a "Persecution" and a "Public Scandal."

[Special To The Advertiser.]
TORONTO, March 2.—Pressing his motion for a return of all correspondence relating to the appointment and dismissal of Peter White, K.C., as counsel for the Conservative party at the timber probe, Hon. G. H. Ferguson, Conservative leader, revived the whole timber controversy on the floor of the Ontario Legislature yesterday.

Liberals in the House were able to sit back during the afternoon and enjoy the heated controversy between Government and Conservative forces. They denoted by their vigorous applause, however, entire sympathy with the Government's effort to relieve whatever losses in timber revenue the province may have sustained under the Conservative regime.

Peter White, K.C., according to Attorney-General Ferguson, was dismissed as Conservative party counsel at the timber probe because of his "insolence and truculence" in letters to the department. Whatever the merits of Mr. White's argument that he was placed to delve into affairs of the Liberal regime, Hon. Mr. Raney said the Government did not propose to submit to the tone of his letters of refusal. He said that Glyn Oserly, K.C., counsel for Shelvick Clark Company, but that was guilty of the same "insolence and truculence" when he declined to furnish information to the department.

Mr. Ferguson, as usual, went out hot foot after the commissioners, and termed the probe a "persecution" and a "public scandal." Attorney-General Raney just as vigorously defended them as men doing a noble duty.

ASKS FOR CORRESPONDENCE.
TORONTO, March 2.—Chancellor of the Exchequer, Hon. W. E. Ferguson, attorney-general, and Hon. W. E. Raney, attorney-general, asked the Ontario Legislature, the Conservative leader resumed the debate on the motion of Charles McCrea, Suburban, asking for a return of correspondence regarding payment of counsel fees to Peter White, K.C., who acted as counsel for the Conservative party for some time.

The inquiry being carried on by the royal commission composed of Justices Riddell and Litchford, Hon. Mr. Ferguson cited precedents for the payment by the Government of all counsel fees in such cases, and asserted that Mr. White had done excellent work in bringing out information valuable to the commission.

This has been the most outrageous unfair commission that has ever conducted an inquiry. Mr. Ferguson declared. As to the attorney-general's treatment of Peter White, Mr. Ferguson said: "The attorney-general says, 'You are being paid by me. You will pay as I tell you or get off the job.' The only thing left for Mr. White to do was to resign, which he did. Mr. Ferguson added, Mr. Ferguson found fault because R. T. Harding, the former chief counsel in the timber inquiry, had not asked questions bearing on the administration of the lands and forests under the Liberal regime.

Premier Marvles. "Would it not have been possible during the fifteen years your party was in power to have conducted all the necessary investigation?" The premier added that the matter was running the House.

Hon. Mr. Ferguson retorted that some people are marvellous in the way the premier is not conducting the affairs of the House.

Mr. Ferguson, referring to the timber commission, said it was a public scandal that the attorney-general had appointed a member of a former government of Ontario to investigate the affairs of a succeeding government.

The attorney-general stated that it was a wide open inquiry, and that there was not a word in the order-in-council limiting the inquiry to the Conservative regime. So far as he had read the evidence taken by the timber commissioners, Mr. Raney said, he had not seen on partisan word reported by the commission.

Speaking of a letter written to him by Peter White, K.C., referring to a resolution passed by the Conservative convention held in Toronto last December, Mr. Ferguson said that he had not seen the letter as "insolence and truculence" when he declined to furnish information to the department.

What are Mr. White's duties? The attorney-general replied: "As much as Mr. Harding's: to bring out the facts."

Purpose of Inquiry. The purpose of the inquiry, he said, was to get the facts, not to "get Howard Ferguson, not to improve the administration of the province of Ontario."

Referring to the reported threat of Mr. Ferguson that he would "nail him to the fence," the attorney-general asked: "Could you imagine the honorable member for Southwest Toronto (H. H. Dewar, K.C., Liberal leader) stretched on the barn door of the honorable member for Grenville (Mr. Ferguson), together with the hide of the attorney-general?"

It would not even bury them in the same grave, said Mr. Ferguson. Capt. Joseph R. Thompson, Northeast Toronto, suggested that "there are so many holes shot in the hides they are not worth anything."

Hon. Mr. Raney said the timber trade was colossal. "We will never be paid for all the timber that has been stolen from this province," he added. Raney said he did not defend every word of R. T. Harding done, but Mr. Harding had done signal service to the province.

MANITOBA URGES LIFTING EMBARGO
The Legislature Unanimously Backs Doherty—Fear For Cattle Trade.

WINNIPEG, Man., March 2.—Removal of the British embargo on Canadian cattle was unanimously urged by the Legislature at this afternoon's session on the grounds that there is no disease in Canadian cattle which justifies the continuance of the ban, and that the uncertainty as to future markets for live stock in the Dominion is having a paralyzing effect on the cattle raising industry of the west.

The resolution, which was proposed by Hon. G. H. Malcolm, minister of agriculture, was seconded by W. J. Holmes, leader of the opposition, and was carried by a vote of 15 to 1.

CHAMP CLARK, VETERAN, DIES
With Record of 26 Years in Congress Aged Leader Succumbs.
