## Malton indoor soccer league ready to roll

Maple Leaf Gardens Crescent Town... now Malton has decided to get into the act and try on for size the type of soccer that has been condensed for wintertime consumption.

The Malton Minor Soccer Association announced this week the formation of a winter indoor gym soccer program, to be held at Westwood Secondary School from early January to April.

Notice of registrations has been distributed in Malton area schools. Registrations will be held on Sat., Dec. 29 between 2 and 5 p.m. at the Community Hall, Victory Cres.

"This is a first for Malton," said league president H.R. Kellman. "The emphasis will be on letting the boys, aged 10 to 14, play in door soccer on an equal-time-for-all basis, stressing all-out physical participation and strict rules of discipline."

Kellman adds, that proper coaching "and the fine points of soccer will be reserved until the spring next year when players will register for the 'real thing', minor soccer on the playing fields of Malton."

First games are slated for Saturday, Jan. 5. The league will consist of six-a-side teams. Registration fees \$3, of which \$2 will be credited towards the player's summer registration fee for 1974, reducing the cost to \$7.

The first indoor soccer league in the Metro Toronto area has been founded in Crescent Town, Scarborough, three years ago.

A pro circuit (World Indoor Football Association) is operating out of Maple Leaf Gardens with average attendance over the 8,000 mark for the first five weeks.

## Penmen set to defend Chatham juvenile crown

Coach Hector Lachapelle figures his Mississauga Rep Penmen have a red-hot chance to melt away the ice and defend their championship crown at the annual Chatham Juvenile Invitational Hockey Tournament — even though they may have to do it without the services of the club's leading goal-getter.

Paul Rusak, who has rifled in 11 goals to lead Penmen's scoring parade, will be lost for two games or more, Lachapelle figures.

Rusak was ejected with a major game misconduct from a recent Penmen clash against Robinsons. He got the gate when he questioned a decision by the referee.

"It's an automatic two-game suspension," says Lachapelle. "But it could be as much as six, if we're unlucky."

Penmen will travel to Chatham Thursday night and open the defense of their crown with a first round clash with Chicago Saints Friday morning. Finals are scheduled for Saturday night.

The big question is whether Rusak will be available.

Another Mississauga team, in the tourney will be Cawthra Kings of the Mississauga Hockey League's AAA division. "We're not facing them, unless both teams fight their way through their own section," Hector says.

Penmen are in the A group, while Cawthra joins the host and joint-tourney favorite Chatham in the B division.

This week, Lachapelle's charges boosted their unbeaten streak to nine straight matches via a 4-1 tie with West Toronto Hawks.

Down 3-1 early in the second period (Mark Stobart was responsible for the marker), Penmen stormed back with three unanswered goals by Randy Bissonette, Bob Doogeuel and John Black to hold a 4-3 lead going into the final minute.

However, a West Toronto marker in the dying seconds robbed the Mississaugans of their ninth consecutive triumph.
