It is expected that English, Scotch, and Irish folk-lore will form the subject of publications to be issued by the Folk-Lore Society at regular intervals. While the Folk-Lore Society assumes the regular expenses of publication, the increase of material to be published makes it necessary that the excess expenditure be provided. The Ontario Branch of the American Folk-Lore Society has assumed control of the work to be done in Ontario. The minimum share of the Branch towards the expenses of publication is estimated at \$350 annually, which is to be covered mostly by membership-fees and the sale of Canadian numbers. Under similar arrangements the Quebec Branch is now thriving, with two French volumes to its credit.

The yearly special meeting of the Ontario Branch is to be held in conjunction with the sessions of the Royal Society of Canada.
