preference must be tariff preference, to the exclusion of
all other kinds of preference. We believe that preference
of any kind, worked out intelligently in relation to all
existing conditions, would not be given or accepted by any
government unless there was in it something of mutual
advantage and that, where more in the way of mutual advantage
is to be sought, it can be sought in a number of directions
instead of exclusively in the direction of tariff preference.

Term "Canada First" wholly misleading as applied to preference granted

Dunning budget were not granted to further British interests at the expense of Canadian interests, as the leader of the government sought, by the use of the term "Canada First", to have Canadians believe. The government of the day was every bit as much concerned with the real interests of Canada as my right honourable friend and his followers.
