The Pope's Message is Entirely Religious in Tone. Rome, Oct. 5.-The Osservatore-

Romano publishes the text of an encyclical by Pope Pius X., commemorating Leo XIII. The encyclical, the arst issued by Pope Pius, is entirely and interesting part is as follows: "We proclaim that we have not in the sureme Pontificate any other programme than to gather all things in Inrist, so that Christ shall be all in all. There will not be lacking those who, neasuring divine things by human laws, will try to discover what are the serte intents of our soul. We say to them that we do not wish to be, and, with Divine aid, shall not be, before numan society other than the minister of God, of whose authority we are the lepositary." His Holiness declares hat obedience to the laws and submission to the Government are the luty of all citizens.

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LES DEBATS BANNED. Archbishop Bruchesi's Pastoral Let-

Montreal, Oct. 5.-A pastoral letter from Archbishop Bruchesi was read in all the Roman Catholic churches in episcopal authority and the rules of the index" all faithful to read, sell, buy or keep in their possession Les Debats, a French Sunday newspaper, of which Mr E. Charles is editor. The letter says that the paper insuited bishop and priests, citizens worthy of respect and priests, citizens worthy of respect and Kings most sacred, culogized condemned literary works, praised the productions of a French writer who died recently, and whose name cannot be uttered in a Christian church, published regarding the theory of evolution doctrines that border on heresy, insulted the memory of Bishop Bourget, Plus IX. and the syllabus, and turned into ridicule a pastoral letter on Sunday observance. These offences it had committed in the face of repeated warnings. As the ban is likely to force the paper to cease publication, it is expected that a civil sult for damages against the Archbishop will begin, a proceeding not without precedent have.
