Word was received recently by his friends in Picton that Capt. Ernest G. Hudgin, who went overseas in command of one of the companies of the 80th Batt., has been wounded.

Capt. Hudgin was a Picton boy and was in charge of the company that was quartered at the Picton Armouries last winter. Particulars of his injuries have not yet been received.

After an illness of several months' duration, there passed away at his residence on Washburn street on Saturday, Nov. 4th, William Grange Todd, aged sixty-three years. The late Mr. Todd was born in London, England, and came of a very highly respected family.

The death occurred in Picton on Friday last, Nov. 3rd, of one of the oldest citizens of the county in the person of Robert Kelly, aged 91 years. Mr. Kelly was a native of this county and was born in the township of Athol. He leaves to survive him a family of eight children—five sons, John of Newmarket, Burton of Detroit, G. C. of Michigan, Emmet of Picton and Malcolm on the homestead farm in Athol, and three daughters, Mrs. A. H. Saylor of Bloomfield, Mrs. F. Ketchum of Picton and Mrs. Eberle of Erie, Penn.

An old and respected resident of Wellington passed to his reward on Sunday, November 5th, 1916, in the person of Thomas Jackson. Mr. Jackson was born at West Lake over eighty years ago, but had resided in Wellington the greater part of his long life, where he was engaged in the grocery business in connection with the telegraph office, which he conducted for many years. Besides his wife, he leaves a son and daughter. His son is connected with one of the large life insurance companies in New York City and his daughter is the wife of Ex-Warden D. W. Robertson, of Coneseon. Mr. Jackson was an Ex-Rieve of Wellington and a brother of the late James Jackson of Picton.

The funeral took place on Monday morning and was largely attended. Service was conducted in the R. C. church by Rev. Father Murtagh, after which the remains were interred in Marmora cemetery.—The Herald.
