THE PROBS

TORONTO, May 22. - The area of low pressure now extends from the great lakes to the Gulf of St. Lawrence and is more pronounced than it was yesterday. Heavy showers have occurred in northwestern Ontario and are likely to be general in eastern Ontario and St. Lawrence Valley.

Forecast. Fresh to strong west and northwest winds, local showers. Saturday - Fresh northwest winds, fine and cooler.

Appointed to Committee. Chief Engineer L. G. Ireland will this afternoon attend a meeting of the rate committee of the Hydro Commission. Mr. Ireland was appointed to that committee only last week.

Scout Notes. All the Scouts in the city are invited to the marshmallow roast which will be held near Mt. Pleasant Camp on Saturday night at 7.45. This camp fire is to give the local Scouts an opportunity of meeting the Hamilton Headquarters Patrol, which will remain in camp until Monday.

Duffs Recent Change. The Duffs have been ordered to Petawawa instead of Niagara Falls, as expected, and they are not at all kindly disposed towards the change. It is understood that life in camp at one place is much stricter in every sense than in the other.

The Township Council yesterday visited the Hamilton road among other places yesterday, and the resolve was made to have the Hamilton road repaired for the repair of a slide on the Hamilton road where many motors have recently been stalled. It will be drained and given a heavy coat of crushed stone, and ought to be in good condition in a few days.

OIL FOR ECHO PLACE ROAD

Residents Are Planning on Keeping the Dust Down Caused by Autos.

The regular meeting of the Echo Place Improvement Association was held last night in Mohawk Park school. President Morley Myers was in the chair. In the absence of H. C. Thomas, Secretary, H. E. Craddock very kindly filled his chair. Communications were read from S. G. Read regarding opening up of May's avenue. He asked one of the members who has property on that street if he would take the matter up with the Township Council and have them attend to the opening of the street. The association took no action on this matter, as it was felt that the party who sold the lots should attend to the opening of the avenue or see that it is attended to.

A special committee was appointed, consisting of A. M. Patterson, J. L. Barnes and H. E. Craddock, to confer with the Mayor, Leavay and the Council with regard to the opening of Hamilton road from Mohawk entrance to Radial crossing.

It has been reported that the West-ern Counties are desirous of furnishing light to the residents of Echo Place. F. T. Morrow, chairman of the light committee, will look into the matter and get the rates and full particulars.

A letter was received from the Agricultural Department saying that it would be impossible to send a man to lecture on gardening or poultry until the coming fall. This matter was laid over until a later date.

FLYERS' MASCOTS.

Aviator Hucks Never Ascends Without a Pair of Spats On.

The big risk' armen run keep their nerves continually on edge and for this reason the majority of well-known flyers have a somewhat erratic temperaments. Resultantly, all manner of curious fads and beliefs exist at the aerodromes.

Hucks, for instance, the well-known English flyer who recently emulated Pegoud's feat of flying upside down in the air, invariably ascends in his monoplane with a pair of immaculate spats decorating his boots.

Evidently he regards these boot decorations as mascots, for on the dullest of days Hucks, with his inevitable spats, tramps through the mire in the wake of the mechanics pushing his machine out to the starting point.

Grabme-White has a somewhat similar fad. He makes all his big flights wearing a pair of check riding breeches.

His big flying success was carried out whilst wearing breeches of this kind. He was thus garbed during his great London to Manchester flight in the race against Paulhan, and it was in a pair of check riding breeches that he flew to victory when he secured the Go long distance Flying Cup for England a short time back.

This craving for check riding breeches has affected other airmen, too, and one of the best known of those who fly in this garb is Bielewicz, the Parisian flyer, who not long back flew across the Alps in a Harriot monoplane.

On the other hand, several airmen refuse to go aloft unless accompanied by some shabby relic of early flying days. The fact that Beaumont, the famous French flyer, is very particular about the cap he wears when making long flights, has already been commented upon.

The late Col. Cozy was perhaps the least superstitious of all airmen, but even he disliked going aloft without a shabby old steering wheel which had accompanied him right through his flying career.

This strange steering device was fixed on the very first machine Cozy got off the ground on. It figured in every machine he built from that occasion, and with it he steered to success. His big win in the military tri last year. One of the most handsome wreaths at his funeral was a perfect model of this strange-looking steering wheel, built up by choice.

Airmen's fads, however, generally take the form of some peculiar emblem which acts as a mascot during their flights.

Vodrines, the French flyer, has affixed to his speedy racing monoplane a little portrait of the famous painter of the "Mona Lisa." With a machine thus decorated he recently flew at a speed of one hundred and eighty miles an hour.

Natural airmen like carrying a lion's tooth aloft as a mascot - a practice coined by the late Lieut. Parke, who always carried such a mascot during his flights, and a few men came out of so many men unscathed as he.

Another interesting fad of airmen is their aversion to flying aeroplanes built on natural stability lines. The average flyer is much happier in one of the tricky racing aeroplanes, which are completely dependent on the skill of the pilot for their balance.
