Twin City Dividend—Twin City preferred, 1 3/4 per cent; common 1 1/2 per cent; both payable October 1st to shareholders of record. American Steel Foundries—American Steel Foundries has been put on a 7 per cent basis.
Temiskaming Dividend—The directors of the Temiskaming Mining Company declared a three per cent dividend yesterday, payable in October.
Fixing Price of Crop—Winnipeg, Sept. 6.—The Board of Grain Supervisors for Canada are in session here today determining what price will be paid for Canada's 1917 wheat crop, and settling upon the policy which will be followed in handling the crop.
Agers—Work on the Blesky claim is being pushed ahead as fast as possible and drill cores, which have shown free gold. The strike was made at 750 feet and the vein is said to be 15 feet wide. If this proves correct it is possible it may develop into a good ore-body.
Adams—Work is proceeding as fast as possible at this property, and it is understood some good ore is being bagged, which is expected to run well over 2,000 ounces to the ton. It is expected that a shipment will be made in the very near future. The new vein on the 300 foot level is showing up very well and good results may be expected from this company from now on. CHICAGO WOMAN WAS MURDERED
Mrs. Maude King Did Not Suicide, Says Coroner Hoffman
Chicago, Sept. 8.—A post-mortem examination last night of the body of Mrs. Maude A. King, widow of James C. King, late Chicago millionaire, whose death resulted from a bullet wound near Concord, N.C., Aug. 29, indicated that Mrs. King was murdered, in the opinion of Coroner Hoffman.
"In my opinion, from investigation and post-mortem examination the wound was not self-inflicted," said Coroner Hoffman. "In contradiction to the opinion of the coroner's jury at Concord."
