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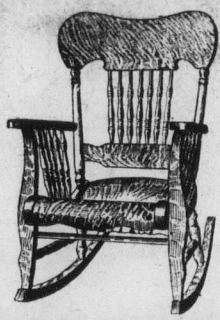

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AN EARLTOWN MAN SLEEPS IN WELLINGTON'S BED.

Mrs. MacKay, Windsor, has received a letter from her husband, Capt. J. S. MacKay, C.A.M.C., saying that he is billeted in a famous old Chateau, and sleeps in the bed occupied by the Duke of Wellington the night before the Battle of Waterloo in 1815.

Dr. MacKay, was born amid the heather of Earltown, where he practiced until a few years ago, when he removed to Windsor.

THE LATE CECIL W. ELLIS OF BROOKVALE, HX. CO.

Cecil W. Ellis, of Brookvale, Middle Musquodoboit, son of Reuben Ellis of that place past away in Vancouver en route to Siberia. After several vain attempts to enlist with some overseas battalion, being rejected on account of his age, his persistence was at last rewarded by being taken on with the 10th Siege Battery, of which he became a very popular member. On the calling of troops for Siberia he was among the first to volunteer and being accepted entrained for Vancouver. He was there only a short time when it was necessary to undergo an operation for abscess on the scalp, which proved successful, as he was doing guard duty 24 hours later. It was while doing his duty he contracted pneumonia and past away.

The many friends of Cecil will be very sorry to hear of his death, as he was very popular and one of the most promising young men in the home district.

Miss Jean Ellis, who is at present staying with his cousin, Mrs. J. B. Phillips, Armdale, is a sister of deceased. He is survived also by mother and father, at home, and four sisters and two brothers. The sisters are Ruby, Ruth and Jean, at home, and Mrs. Piers of Pugwash. The brothers are John, at home, and George in the American army in France. The body was shipped on the 3rd of February to Halifax.

OUR DEAD HEROES HONORED IN A MEMORIAL SERVICE.

On Sunday evening Feb. 2, the citizens of Oxford and vicinity assembled in a union service in the Baptist church filling it to the doors to unite in honoring the dead memories of six others of our brave boys who have made the "Supreme sacrifice" on the blood-stained battlefields of France and Flanders. Over the church organ hung in graceful folds the banner that for a thousand years has braved the breeze and on the walls were the Honor Rolls of the three churches each draped in the flags of the Allies. The musical selections were rendered by a large union choir being those good old hymns "How Firm a Foundation" "The Son of God goes Forth to War" and "Jesus Lover of My Soul." The service opened with singing of the Doxology, and scripture reading by Rev. G. R. Kyle after which a very patriotic, comforting and inspiring prayer was offered by Rev. J. W. O'Brien. A male quartette composed of Rev. P. R. Hayden, J. C. McCormack, R. R. Hickman and L. Mitchell then sang that beautiful selection entitled "Beyond" which touched the hearts of all present. That grand old favorite hymn "Lead Kindly Light" was then rendered by the choir.

An able and much appreciated address by the Rev. G. R. Kyle then followed.

We regret our space will not allow us to print the splendid abstract of this eloquent and sympathetic address.

Rev. P. R. Hayden then read a list of the names of all those who had donated the Khaki from the town some 82 in number making special mention of those who had offered up their lives of which there were thirteen in number. The boys for whom this Memorial service was now held were as follows:—
Pte. Alfred Miller, enlisted Sept. 15th, 1915 in the 85th Battalion.
Pte. Walter Ross, enlisted April 7th, 1916, in the 193rd Batt. but on going to France was transferred to the 25th.
Pte. Rex Gordon, enlisted May 24th 1916, in 193rd Batt. and afterwards transferred to the R.C.R. in England.
Pte. Allen Thornthwaite, enlisted on Mar. 7th, 1916, in the 193rd Batt. and afterwards transferred to the 185th Highland Brigade.
Corp. Shirley Lowther, enlisted on Oct. 10, 1915, in 85th Batt.
Sergt. Harold Davis, enlisted on Oct. 22nd, 1915, in 85th Batt. and afterwards entered the Imperial Air Forces in which he had just about completed his course when taken suddenly ill with pneumonia passing on to be with his comrade heroes.

Just here Miss Bessie Robb sang a beautiful solo entitled "He Wipes a Tear from Every Eye" the rendition of which impressed those present with the solemnity of the occasion.
