

BRIARWOOD IS IN DEMAND.

Supply for Pipes Being Sought in Mediterranean Countries.

Here's an item of interest to all fond f the solace of pipe and tobacco. In answer to a letter from an American manufacturer of briar root pipes requesting information as to the marke for briar root in Spain, Consul General B. H. Ridgely, of Barcelona, replies as

follows:
"There is no briar root industry in Spain and pipes are virtually not manu-factured in this country. The compara-tively few which are used are imported from England and France. In the district of Gualba there are forests of cestnut trees and the country people in that region occupy their spare time during the winter cutting this wood into rough shapes of pipes, which are shipped from Barcelona to Marseilles, where they are finished and marketed. I was also advised in the course of my investigation that briar root was largely found in Corsica, and I at once wrote there from England and France. In the dis-

in Corsica. and I at once wrote there for information on the subject.

"The result was a letter, from which I take the following interesting para-graph: Briar root is unobtainable just now. The two Corsican manufaceurers here have already refused orders from America amounting to 15,000 bags. A commission firm has a great many orders, amounting to thousands of bags per month, but the goods can not be had. There is an immense demand for the article, and I repeat that this can not be supplied in Corsica."
