Sudden News of Event Disconcerted the Diplomats.

Kaiser William's Political Astuteness Admired In St. Petersburg-Object of the Meeting Said to Be Friendly -Czar's Actions Will Be Closely Watched en His Return-Paris As a Result Fears Two Things.

St. Petersburg, July 24.-On the eve eace conference and with a sud-already disconcerting to diplo-nd court circles, the Emperor matic and court circles, the Emperor left Peterhof yesterday on board the imperial yacht Poler-Star for a conference with Emperer William, who is cruising on the Mohenzollers in Finnish waters. The first interview of the Sovereigns was expected to take place last evening off the Finnish port of Borgo, at the mouth of the Gulf of Finland, near Helsingfors, 45 miles from St. Petersburg.

This will be followed by another interview to-day, after which Emperor Nicholas will return to St. Petersburg and Emperor William will continue his cruise. The Emperor is accompanied by his brother. Grand Duke Michael Alexandrovitch, and a considerable suite, including Count Benkendorff, marshal of the court; Gen. Baron W.

marshal of the court; Gen. Baron W. Fredericks, Minister of the Imperial house; Cbunt Heyden, chief of the Imperial chancellerie; Admiral Birlleff, Minister of Marine; Capt. Non Essen, who commanded the battleship Sevasto pel during the siege of Port Arthur: Capt. Chagin, who commanded the Almaz, the only cruiser of Admiral Ro-jestvensky's fleet to reach Vladivestock after the battle of the Sea of Japan; Capt. Hintze, naval attache of the Ger-Capt. Mintze, naval attache of the German embassy; also a party of courtiers and the Emperor's escort of sailors and marines, with a guard commanded by Admiral Neeloff.

Caused a Surprise.

The idea, the report says, met with
the Emperor's favor, but the final arrangements were only completed Saturday, and some members of the Imperial family were hastily commanded Saturday night to accompany His Ma

Jesty.

Many diplomats were taken completely by surprise by the news of yesterday; the rumors that a meeting was contemplated, which were current since Friday, having met with the flattest denials in official quarters, and the German Ambassador having stated that he knew nothing of any such plan being on foot

on foot, Emperor William's action was in stantly connected with the Morocean question, and admiration for his poli-tical astuteness in realizing his opportical astuteness in realizing his opportunities was expressed on all sides.
The action of Emperor William in seeking a conference at this moment is
generally interpreted as an assurance
of his moral support of Russia in the
coming pour pariers at Washington and
Portsmouth, and to show that German
participation in the recent Japanese
loan was not a mark of the elienation
of German sympathies from Russia.

Witte Has Met Rouvier.

Parls, July 24.—As a sequel to the conference between Premier Rouvier and M. Witte, Saturday the Russian peace plenipotentiary held an extended conversation with M. Nelidoff the Russian Ambassador after which a special courier left for St. Petersburg having despatches for the Emperor. There is despatches for the Emperor. There is reason to believe that the French Pre-mier is now fully acquainted with the Russian standpoint and with the line of action which M. Witte will adopt at the peace conference.

M. Witte appears to be satisfied with

M. Rouvier's assurances that France will adopt every possible means to as-sist her ally to reach a satisfactory ar-rangement. The friendly relations of the French Government with that of Great Britain will undeubtedly play a prominent part when the period for a direct exchange of views begins. It is believed that this was the chief point discussed during the conversation at

the Qual d'Orsay.

Until now both parties have succeeded in keeping their respective programs from publicity and therefore assertions managing from various quarters are emanating from various quarters pur porting to specify the claims of either

porting to specify the claims of either side are purely speculative.

It is the universal desire here that the result of the conference will be a cessation of the hostilities while the hope is expressed that Russia will be able to find an issue from her awkward situation without sacrificing her national self respect.

CZAR AND KAISER MEET IMMENSE JAP SICKLE

Oyama Has 550,000 Men to Harvest Russians in Manchuria

Japanese Troops Landed in the Gulf of Gashkevitch, Near Possiet Bay, and Jap Torpedo Boats Approach Several Bays Near Vladivosteck-Memerial Day Was Uneventful In St. Petersburg-Zemstvos Congress.

Uridiapupdse, July 24.—The Japanese armies at present occupy the pesition of an immense siekle, with the handle reaching from a few miles south of Liaoyang and passing through Chantefu, the blade circling northward toward Kirin, with the tip on the Corean ceast south of Possiet Bay.

It is estimated that Gen. Nogl has 80 battalians, Gen. Uku 60, Gen. Nodlus 36, Gen. Kurchi 150, Gen. Kawamura 90, and Gen. Hasegawa 120, the battalions averaging a thougand men, which makes the numerical strength of the Japanese 556,000 bayonets, with 2,000 field and mountain guns and about 100 steps guns.

Troops Land Near Vladivestock.
St. Petersburg, July 24.—The cerrespendent of The Novoe Vreyma, with the Russian 11th army corps, says that Japanese torpedo.boats, during a thick mist and rain, approached several bays near Vladivestock, and that they sent a landing party ashore in the Guif of Gashkevitch, near Possiet Bay.

Zemstve Congress Concludes. loscow, July 23.—The final meeting a the semstvo congress yesteday adepted a metion of Prince Dolgouroki, that the bureau he granted power to call to the next congress representatives from the outskirts of the empire and from places where zemstvos are not held, and also from various agricultural and financial societies. The bureau is fur-ther authorized to enter into an agree-ment with various organizations. After arranging for financial support of the congress by taxing delegations, a pro-posal to invite peasants to the congress vas adopted.

The congress unfavorably received the suggestion that workmen's organizations be invited, and referred the matter to the bureau.

On motion of Frince Shakoffskoy, it was decided te organize assemblies throughout the country and submit to them the canclusions of the congress respecting the seheme of Minister of Intesier Bouligin.

Japan Buys Theroughbred Horses.

Buffalo, July 24.—Representatives of the Japanese Government have just bought \$110,000 worth of horses at a stock farm at East Aurora. There are 34 herses in the deal, and all will be shipped to Japan for breeding purposes. The average price is about \$3,000 for each horse.
