A Trip to the Centennial.

To the Editor of the Guelph Herald.
DEAR SIR:—In my last letter I gave you an account of our trip to the time of arrival in Philadelphia. But do you think we got our cattle off then? No, not until late in the afternoon. We were surprised to find all the Canadian exhibitors of horses still there, five days after the day named for closing. No doubt you will want to know why this was the case. The Commissioners said they would have to wait on the cattle coming, so that they might get the cattle to the fair in time. The Commissioners' rule was not to run on the cattle coming, in although they knew, Grand Trunk cars would not run on that road. Perhaps it was to make a little money for the Americans, as they took fees at the gates at the time, and I noticed, by the way, that the receipts on the last of the five days were \$750. I would ask whether the Canadian Commission got a share of the plunder. I might here say the exhibitors of horses were very irregular, and no wonder. Our cattle were very much jaded after being so long on the cars, and I need not tell you of our stock raisers that anything like perfection in breeding the Bays and Whites was not until after we held an inauguration meeting that we got feed the cattle would eat; and I will further state that it was only with the greatest pressure that we could bring to bear on our incompetent Commissioners that we could get enough of feed of any kind for our stock. But let us see how we compare were quite a number of herds, including a number from England. Some of the animals in this class were very good. Among the American exhibitors I might mention B. B. Groom, of Kentucky; Eli Elliott, of Iowa; Mr. Grant, of Kansas; and a number of others. Many of the animals were of very superior quality and ranking very high in pedigree. Indeed the Wars of the Rosses were not waged more determinedly than that between the houses of the Bays and the Whites, aristocrats of the best producing family. Amongst the Canadian exhibits of short horns were the herds of Messrs. Hunter, of Alton; Russell, of Richmond Hill; and Telfer, of Posenoy, all men of valor in the prize ring, as will be seen when the awards are made known. There was also Wm. Miller, of Ailsa, with his beautiful heifers, wearing their golden laurels won in the Western States. Mr. Boak's two-year-old bull will also be read about in the halls of Messrs. Terryberry and Gardhouse were splendid animals, being the largest framed bulls on the ground. The Durham cattle from Canada would have been hard to beat in any country and certainly were not beat at the World's Show. Quite a number of Devons were shown, but the breeders thought that their herds could be very much improved by buying the two bulls belonging to Mr. George Ruid, of Poughkeepsie, N. Y. Mr. Thomson and Mr. Hildes, of Missisquoi, were the only exhibitors from Canada and although there was a host against them they also proved to be worthy men of the North. In the exhibition of the only Canadian exhibitor, but there was a great number of this breed shown by the Americans. In Herefords and Galloways I was the only exhibitor from this side. I might say here, that if Mr. Stone had crossed the border with his magnificent herd of Herefords there would have been the best display of this stock ever seen in America and certainly, as it was, they compared very favorably with the Short Horns. There were over forty head from the herds of Barz, of Missisquoi; Merriman, of Maryland; Miller and others, whose herd carried off the sweepstakes prize from Short Horns to that of two of the largest Fairs in the West. In this category I had nothing to fight, as although there are quite a number of herds in different States, they dare not face the foe. One gentleman from Michigan, Mr. Roush, who was the Centennial, came over to Canada, when he thought the camp was weak, but with what success you readers already know. In fat cattle Satchell Bros., of Ottawa, and Mr. Terryberry, were the only exhibitors from the Dominion. One word about the Satchell cattle. The steer, "Lord Dufferin," is a thorough bred Short Horn, bred by Messrs. Thomson, of Whitby, but has been fed by Satchell Bros for two years and is admitted by all that have seen him, that he is one of the best finished steers, if not the best, ever exhibited in America, and undoubtedly will get the highest award although there were the steers "General Grant," "General Kearney," and the veteran "Stonewall Jackson," the triplet steers, and many others, certainly making the heaviest, if not the fattest, yard of cattle ever exhibited. One word for poor "Stonewall." He is still a fine steer, but with his false tail and false horn it is evident that with him the light of other days hath faded. Messrs. Satchell's Durham, bred by the late John Tick, of Guelph, and fed by them for two years and is of the very finest quality. The

based his protest on the following series of contents for the championship rule:

"3.—No game shall count in the series of contents for the championship rule in which the rules of this Association shall have been violated, and no games of clubs which have not played at least two games with each of the contestants shall count in the championship series."
He claimed that the two clubs mentioned had violated the above rule, and that their records should be stricken from the records of the championship, and the records of the St. Lawrence and Standard clubs were struck out of the championship series. Only the records of the Tecumseh and the Maple Leafs were now before the Committee. This record stood as follows:

When the committee took the above into consideration, Mr. Weir, on behalf of the Maple Leaf club, protested against the record of the Tecumseh club being received. He contended that the Tecumseh club had not completed their series of games for the championship, as provided by the following section:
"2.—The series for the championship shall be four, and each club shall play four games with every other contestant club at such time and place as they may mutually agree upon. All games must be played before October the 1st of each year."
Mr. Weir also stated that they had violated article six of the constitution, which provides that no club belonging to the association shall play a match game with any other Canadian club outside the latter or any other grounds not belonging to clubs of the association. The Tecumseh had violated this rule by playing on the 20th of September with the Etna Club, of Exeter, and on the grounds of that club. On these two protests considerable discussion took place, and the defence set up by Mr. Gorman was that the Tecumseh supported the Exters belonged to the Association. He alleged that they wrote to Mr. Moore, of London, asking the name of the Secretary, and they on this slight ground played the game. Section one of the Championship Code provides that application must be made to the Clerk of the Judiciary Committee for a position, and as Mr. Moore occupies that position, it is extremely hard to see how the "Red Men" could suppose that the Etna club was a member of the Association. However the Judiciary Committee, on being answered as above decided not to sustain the protest in that instance. It was also argued against the first portion of the protest of Mr. Weir, that the Tecumseh had complied with section three, which provides that two games must be played, and that therefore the second section amounted to nil. Finally the majority of the committee overruled the protest in both cases, and decided that both clubs had complied with the rules. As will have been seen above the record was as follows:—

The committee therefore decided that the Tecumseh were champions of Canada for 1875, which entitles them to fly the championship pennant of 1875 during the season of 1877. The chairman was authorized to procure a suitable streamer for the successful club, the same to be procured in Canada if possible. After the members of the Committee had signed the award, the meeting dissolved.

Chalmers' Church Association.

Officers were elected and a committee appointed to draft a constitution and by-laws, which, after the usual reading, were adopted on May 19th, 1876. The first meeting after the association was the first regular meeting of the Association was held in the basement on the evening of Friday, June 9th, 1876. Forty-three names were enrolled, and four meetings were held, when it was thought advisable to discontinue them through the warm summer months. The first meeting after the re-association was called for Friday, 29th September. One other meeting has been held since then, which make in all six regular meetings.
