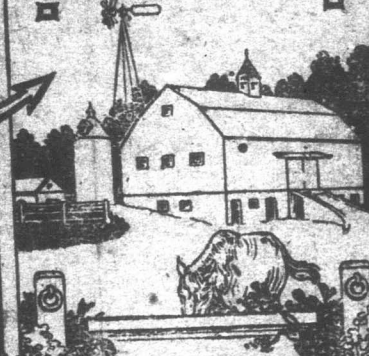

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### CARVELL URGED TO GO FORWARD

A great deal that is untrue as well as coarse and vulgar is being said and written these days about a man called F. B. Carvell because of his timely criticisms regarding war contracts, etc. The government has answered these specific charges with a general denial. This will not satisfy the people nor will it do justice to the government. We remember that when the Dugal charges were made at Fredericton a flat denial was given them by the Hon. Mr. Clarke on behalf of the premier. The public today knows which statement was correct. The charges at Ottawa must be met by something better than a general denial. The distinguished and fearless representative for Carleton county need pay no heed to the criticisms that are being levelled against him by a certain element of the government party. The great services that he has rendered his native province and the Dominion generally in exposing political mountebanks and grafters within the last few years should not soon be forgotten.

Mr. Carvell has done more for the government than it has done for itself inasmuch as he has lopped off some of the dead branches of the government tree. Keep right on, Mr. Carvell, with full steam ahead. You have deserved well of your fellow-Canadian citizens for what you have already done. We believe there is yet much for you to do in public life along the lines you have been working and every Canadian whose opinion counts for anything regardless of party affiliations will agree that there is dire need for just such a man as Frank Broadstreet Carvell in our present-day public life.—New Freeman, St. John.

### Paris Green to be Scarce

It will give our farmer friends, and especially those interested in potato growing, a sizable jolt to learn that there are not over 500 pounds of Paris green in the country today, and that there is at this time no prospect of more being manufactured, owing to the high prices of blue vitriol and white arsenic. The price of Paris green is ranging from 21c to 50c per pound, and blue vitriol, bought for 3 @ 4c a pound, now commands 16 @ 17c. This protective agent has been used so commonly that we had come to look upon it much as we did water, air and sunshine—as one of the necessary factors in potato production, and just what it will be best for us to do to counteract the loss this lack might entail, will be something for our agricultural experimenters and educators to decide.—Maine Farmer.
