

It will give our farmer friends, and especially those interested in potato growing, a sizable jolt tolearn that there are not over 500 pounds of Paris green in the class companies: British & Canadian country today, and that there is at this time no prospect of more being manufactured, owing to the high prices of blue vitriol and real; British Crown Ins. Corp. of London; white arsenic.
