One Cent Claims Against Uncle Sam. There have been several one cent claims against the United States government. One was by the Southern Pacific, which submitted a bill of \$5.20 for hauling government freight. It was a bond aided road, only part of its bills against the government being paid in cash, the rest going to the railroad's credit on the bonds. In this case its credit was \$5.23 and its cash a cent. Another government obligation of a single cent was in favor of a chemical company which for some unexplained reason agreed in a public competition to supply 16,892 pounds of ethyl ether for a cent. The offer was accepted. There were nine signatures, one that of a rear admiral, on the paper relating to the establishment of this claim, and the warrant for payment had to be signed by several persons.

The World of the solid. We live amid matter in three characteristic states—solid, liquid and gaseous. But since hydrogen has been both liquefied and solidified, the investigator, says Professor James Dewar, is introduced into a world of solid bodies. With the aid of the cold furnished by liquid hydrogen, every gaseous substance at present definitely known to the chemist, with the single exception of helium, can be solidified. Even helium, Professor Dewar hopes, may yield to the processes now being employed at the Royal Institute in London. Liquid hydrogen is so light that the only solid substance that will float upon it is pith. Solid hydrogen has a temperature 436 deg. Fahrenheit below zero. When exposed to the cold vapor arising from liquid hydrogen air is instantly turned solid, falls like a miniature snowstorm into the vessel containing the hydrogen, and sinks to the bottom.

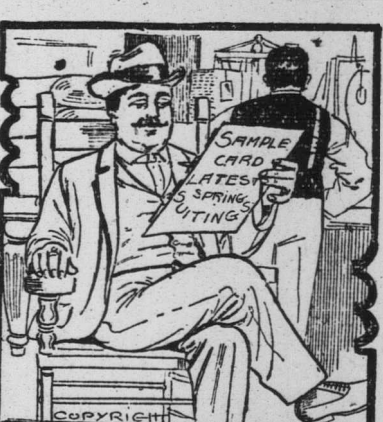
