Two Men Struck by Lightning in the Vicinity of Tillsonburg.

Woman Knocked Unconscious-Baby's Narrow Escape.

WHAT ABERDEEN SAID. The work of the Young Men's Chris-tian Association has received the com-mendation of leaders in every walk of life. Lightning struck the tree, killed the horse and rendered both men uncon-scious. Firby recovered shortly and found that his companion was in a serious condition, being badly burn-ed about the strmes and hands, and suffering from shock. 


