PIONEERING IN
CANADA'S FORESTS

Probably few are closer to the actual forest than the farmer, says the Natural Resources Intelligence Service of the Department of the Interior. As the pioneer he is opening up the country to settlement and living on the very edge of the primeval forest. As such no one stands to suffer more from forest fires. He usually has his family and possessions beneath the roof of his first homestead. Clearing, of course, must be done and clearing fires are necessary but care must be exercised in the setting of clearing fires. Settlers should get in touch with their nearest forest ranger, who is well acquainted with the danger of uncontrolled fires. He will advise when it is safe for clearing fires to be set, and, if conditions are favourable will issue a burning permit.

In another form also the forest appeals to the farmer. It is largely in the forest and wooded areas that he obtains his sport. Hunting and shooting is usually the favorite recreation of the farmer and his family. Without the forest, or with nothing within his reach except a partially burned over area in his immediate neighborhood, he would greatly miss this pleasure.

The latest figures available give the amount of firewood cut in Canada annually as nearly nine million cords. The larger centres of population use coal chiefly for heating purposes. It is the rural districts, therefore, that are more intensely interested in firewood, not only because it means comfort in winter but it also provides a great deal of employment to those who require to help out their farm income. railway ties, telephone poles, pulp wood, etc. are taken out every year and sold by settlers, who, with a burned forest, would be without this welcome help.

Then again, from the larger standpoint, the farmer is interested in the protection of the forest because it means so much in the wealth of Canada and Canada to him means home. After agriculture, the forest and forest products are the largest class of our exports, and go a long way to pay for those things which we are unable to produce or have an insufficient quantity.

There is constant danger of forest fires, and the farmers of Canada can do a great deal, personally and by interesting others, to assure a continuance of the forests, with all they mean as recreational regions, fuel supplies and, where necessary, employment.

PREMIER HERRIOT
OUTLINES FOREIGN
POLICY OF FRANCE

Paris, Jan. 2.--Security was the main theme of Premier Herriot's long awaited speech on France's foreign policy delivered before a great gathering in the Chamber of Deputies today.

The Premier occupied two hours of his three and a half hours' address in drawing up a vivid but dark picture of Germany's activities in armaments while he disposed of the problem of inter-Allied debts in a brief, but never the less emphatic manner.

Never before since he assumed power has Mr Herriot spoken of Germany in the tones he used to day and although he had the entire chamber, excepting the Communists applauding and cheering the general interpretation through out parliament was that his purpose was deeper than merely catering to the right groups--that it was a warning to the British government against the evacuation of the Cologne zone. On the subject of inter-Allied debts the Premier said:

"I come to the question of inter-Allied debts. I shall speak very briefly thereon, for you have remarked how great is the susceptibility of our friends and allies on this subject and you know how even the sublimest words and best sentiments risk at times being interpreted in a regrettable way. What I do is to solemnly repeat once more what M. Viviani has said-- France does not intend to repudiate her debts.

"It is not the government over which I preside, attached as it is to respect for treaties and conventions, that will disavow the principle of debts which France has contracted.

"That being said, we have the right after the speech, filled with such useful figures by Mr Dubois, after Mr Martin's to appeal to the sentiments of solidarity of our Allies and friends.
