Dr McLeod then proceeds to discuss the evidence regarding pauperism and says: "Whatever evidence relating to pauperism was heard in the cours of the commission's investigions in the United States was in agreement with the foregoing statements that nearly all of it is traceable, directly or indirectly to intemperance.

As to disease, insanity and mortality he says: "There is a diversity of opinion among medical experts as to whether or not a moderate consumption of alcoholic liquors is in every case physically injurious. A majority of medical men unhesitatingly endorse total abstinence as safe. Many claim that it is essential to the fullest degree of physical health. All the evidence obtainable goes to show that heavy drinking is universally condemned, and also that there is a growing tendency among medical men to discountenance eyen what is known as moderate drinking."


