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The Fashions.

Coats of satin and plush will still be worn with thin white skirts for evening dress this winter.

Knit Jersey suits are the warmest things for little boys to wear in the winter, but they are very ugly.

The "beaded head" trimming made of cord wound with a tinsel or fine metal, is substituted for bead trimming.

Large embroidered collars like those worn by children, are worn with white muslin dresses trimmed with embroidery.

The substitution of plush for silk or satin as a ground for jet embroidery makes the winter bonnets exceedingly expensive.

One of the new bonnets which requires no trimming but strings and a plume or two, is a revival of the old-fashioned calash.

The only rule in combining the material of a bonnet is that they must match, and that contrasts must be confined to the trimmings.

Suits of cloth and velvet are made up with the two materials alternating in the skirt breadths, and with two capes, one of each material.

Plush is made into branches of berries, and used to trim bonnets. Plush leaves set in the long pile are the trimming of some plush bonnets.

Brocades with no embroidery mingled with their design are considered rather tame by the dressmakers, who aim at having expensive things rather than pretty things.

The mantle collar is the great difficulty about an outside garment now. If that becomes the rest of the cloak may be even more than moderately ugly and yet pass muster.

Children are wearing pretty suits trimmed with plaid, and many of plaid entire. The hoistery comes in checks and plaids to match the suits making a very pretty combination.

The members of the Princess Louise Dragon Guards attended the lecture of Mr. Archibald Forbes, the war correspondent at Ottawa, in full uniform.

The havelock is a long garment in the shape of a close fitting sack, with narrow flat kiltings on the side of the skirts, and a deep, round cape with a velvet collar.

The Duchess de Berri is the new mantle. It is large and flowing, but is gathered nearly to the waist both in front and at the back. The skirt is turned up about one-third of its depth in the back.

Plush is to be the rage, and it is seen in every shade in millinery; all the rich dark shades to which we are accustomed, as well as shaded and mottled plaid, chinchilla plush, and bear-skin, which is finished in long, coarse hairs.

Among the prettiest and most elegant bonnets seen at a recent opening was one in heliotrope plush, with a large roll around the crown of pearly-colored plush, wound with ropes of the lighter shade.

The plumes were shaded in the two tints. Broad strings were roped the same as the roll, and caught in the back with a gold pin.

Very comfortable hoods are made for girls of all ages for winter wear. Some are crocheted and lined with a wadded cap, others are of quilted satin, and some of velvet and satin, either shirred or plain.

Smaller ones are trimmed with lace and ribbon ruchings, larger ones in face, wings, and feather ruchings. Some of the shapes are real hoods, while others are quite scumpe, giving the little ones quite a demure look with their bright baby-faces.

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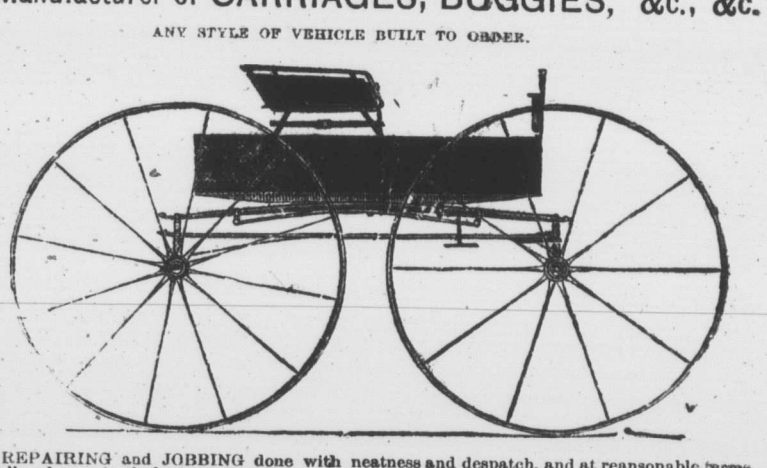
