Interesting Figures Concerning the Institution in Edmonton From Minister of Justice's Report

The report of the Minister of Justice on the penitentiaries of Canada has just come to hand, and contains much valuable information with reference to the institution in Edmonton. The period covered in the report is for the nine months ending March 31st and though conditions as to the number imprisoned, etc., have changed somewhat since that time, the facts in general are applicable to the penitentiary at the present time.

Reports of Officials.

The warden, Matthew McCauley, in

'On August 1, 1906, there were 25 onvicts, and at the end of the fiscal year there were 57 male convicts.
