LONDON, To-Day. King George has donated one thousand dollars to the fund for the Memorial to Captain Scott and his four companions. The amalgamated total subscribed now amounts to \$100,000.

CHIHUAHUA, Mexico, To-Day. The change in the government of Mexico City is immensely popular to the inhabitants of this city, after two years of disorder and business stagnation under the rule of Madero. The Federal troops here who had remained loyal to the Madero Government are now recognizing General Huerta and General Diaz.

NEW YORK, To-Day. Although censorship despatches from Mexico City lifted soon after the change of Government yesterday, the greatest difficulty is being experienced in getting news out of the capital of the latest occurrences there. During the term of censorship news despatches and commercial telegrams accumulated in vast quantities, and the opening of the wires necessarily added greatly to the congestion, with the result that the overtaxed operatives hardly made any visible impression on the mass of despatches awaiting transmission to all parts of the world. Members of Cabinet and most of the other prisoners were released this morning. Francisco Madero, Jose Peino Suarez, Vice-President, and Ferie Gonzales Garza, Governor of the Federal District, were the only two important prisoners held. A group of Senators discussed the question of the Presidency with General Huerta who, it is understood, will receive appointment as Provisional President from the hands of Congress, a meeting of which body has been called.

George St. Church.

Last night's service was largely attended, and was very hearty all through. The Rev. F. R. Matthews was in charge, and he performed his duties very earnestly and zealously, and did his best for the success of the meeting, and the edification of the people. The Rev. Dr. Curtis read the Scripture Lesson, and the Rev. Mr. Bartlett gave the address.

The lesson was in reference to the barren fig-tree, and the address followed along these lines. This parable is one that carries with it many very solemn lessons, and the various points made by Mr. Bartlett were in keeping with its teaching. The fig-tree had been pruned, and dressed, and had all the advantages of the vineyard, and the care of the vine-dresser, and it was in the place for bearing fruit, but withal it failed. Therefore its doom was to be cut down, because it encumbered the ground.

The speaker was very earnest in all that he said, and for the space of twenty minutes he zealously treated his subject, and gave no uncertain sound. After the address the service continued as usual, and was closed at the regular hour.

Only one prisoner appeared in Court to-day, he was a fifty-year-old labourer, of Whitbourne, and was charged with being drunk; he was discharged.

PLYMOUTH, Eng., To-day. Dr. Friedman, who asserts he has discovered a cure for tuberculosis, gave an interview on board the s.s. Kronprinzessin Cecilie, on his way to America, to demonstrate the value of his remedy. He said: "I feel that the first step I would take in the United States should be to treat cases of visible tuberculosis in the presence of American physicians; I could thereby accomplish the double purpose of instructing them and proving the efficacy of the use of live germs. What I mean by visible tuberculosis is fungi in the knee, for instance, which are visible to the eye. I shall be glad if any doctor or important institution in the States will give me a chance to treat such cases."

CARDIFF, Wales, To-day. "We have blown up the Chancellor of the Exchequer's house," said Mrs. Emeline Pankhurst, addressing an enthusiastic meeting of suffragettes here. "The authorities need not look for the women who actually did it. I personally accept full responsibility for it." Mrs. Pankhurst declared if she were sent to penal servitude she would go on hunger strike; "the government will then have either to set me free," she added, "or let me die. If I drop out of a hundred women are ready to take my place."

LONDON, To-day. In a review of the European situation, the Times says: "It is now believed in St. Petersburg, that both Roumania and Bulgaria are willing to submit their differences to the decision of the Powers. According to information received here from our St. Petersburg correspondent, the actual arbitration is likely to be conducted by the Russian and Italian Governments under the auspices of Great Britain. In Sofia considerable uneasiness is caused by the report that the Powers are likely to lean towards Roumania's view. In Bulgaria the impression is that this particular danger will soon cease to be acute. The Roumanian Cabinet met to-day and our Bucharest correspondent reports that public opinion is in favor of arbitration."

A Plant That Coughs.

All have read of carnivorous plants, of laughing plants, and of plants that weep; but who has heard of a plant that coughs? There is the authority of a French botanist, however, for the statement that a plant in various tropical regions actually possesses the power to cough in the most approved manner. The fruit of this plant resembles the common broad bean. It appears that the coughing plant is something of a crank, that it easily works itself into a rage, and that it has a curious horror of all lust. As soon as a few grains of dust are deposited on its leaves, the air chambers that cover their faces and are the respiratory organs of the plant, become filled with gas, swell, and end by driving out the gas with a slight explosion and a sound that resembles so much the cough of a child suffering from a cold as to carry a most uncanny sensation to the one beholding the phenomenon.
