**HOW MAGNA CHARTA GIVES JUSTICE TO THE POOR.**  
 Not long ago it happened that a woman in London owed money to a man. The man to whom she owed the money, the "creditor" as he is called, went to law and got an order from the judge which enabled him to take from the woman who owed him the money, and who is called "debtor," enough of her property to pay the debt. Now the woman was a seamstress and carried her living by her sewing-machine. The creditor sent her to take a sufficient amount of her property to pay the debt. Among other things the creditor took the sewing-machine. This was against the law, and they had no right to it. The woman in her turn went to the magistrate and told him what had been done. The magistrate said at once that the law had been broken. He ordered the creditor to give back the sewing-machine, and to pay a sum of money as a punishment for having broken the law. This is a wise and reasonable rule, for it is only fair that all men and women should be allowed to keep the means by which they get their living. It is only good sense, too, for if one man is allowed to take from the debtor the very things by which he earns his livelihood. In the same way the law forbids a creditor to take the bed on which a man sleeps, or to take the tools with which he does his work. These rules were first laid down in the Great Charter. —From Foster's "History of Eng- land."

 E. J. Cousins' request for a light on the Southside Road was referred to the Lighting Committee.  
 The residents of the Battery peti- tioned for a light. Ordered that the Government put one there.  
 The City Engineer and Health In- spector will visit the Battery and ex- amine the water in the public well there.  
 Geo. Barnes' request for a light on McKays Street was referred to the Lighting Committee.  
 A bill for repairs to fountain in Cliff's Cove, was received from Mrs. Gosling. Council thought that there was funds remaining and Mrs. Gos- ling should pay for repairs.  
 On behalf of St. Michael's congrega- tion, Rev. A. G. C. Stamp asked for eastern boundary of the road that is to be made to improve Mundy Pond Road.  
 Thos. Welsh wrote re building he is going to erect on Water Street. He will be instructed that he must comply with the Act by the building being uninflamable.  
 J. Dooley asked that the license for motor car, which he is not run- ning, go against his horse taxes. Being enquired into.  
 Mrs. Williams' application re bulbs for the park was deferred.  
 R. Power asked to have a horse- shoeing place on Water Street. Granted, provided that there is no door on Water Street and no horse- shed allowed on sidewalk.  
 A gully on Flower Hill was or- dered to be removed.  
 Plans of buildings for W. Martin, Rennie's Mill Road, and J. Ryan, Waterford Bridge Road, were ap- proved.  
 The meeting then closed.
