
Liner Captain's Daughter Cares for Belgian Girl With Hands Cut Off.

She related several incidents of cruelty commited by German officers which had been told her by patients in the hospitals, inclubing that of a boy, aged seven years, who had both his eyes gouged out at the point of a sword, and a woman nursing a haby, whose breasts were slashed.
